Welcome to our Fife Violence Against Women Partnership (FVAWP) Training Programme for October 2026 – March 2027. It brings together all the training co-ordinated by FVAWP.

As part of FVAWP's 2026–2027 Action Plan, we recognise that a skilled and confident workforce is key to providing effective support to women and children affected by all forms of violence against women. This refreshed six-month training programme brings together all learning opportunities delivered or endorsed by FVAWP, offering a coordinated and accessible approach to workforce development.

The programme includes a wide range of learning opportunities delivered through in-person training, webinars and e-learning modules. Open to all partners across Fife, it is designed to build knowledge, strengthen skills and increase confidence among staff and volunteers supporting those affected by gender-based violence. By investing in workforce development, we aim to support safe, consistent and trauma-informed responses, promote a 'no wrong door' approach, and contribute to tackling the gender inequalities that underpin violence against women.

Some courses have prerequisite requirements—for example, completion of a Level 1 course before progressing to Level 2—so participants are encouraged to review course information before booking. All training is provided free of charge, with the exception of Safe & Together.

Sessions are delivered by FVAWP's Learning and Development Officer alongside a range of local and national partners from the voluntary and statutory sectors. Human Trafficking (FVAWP Level 1 E-Learning)



Human trafficking is about the illegal trade of human beings for exploitation, which also encompasses the offence of slavery, servitude and forced or compulsory labour. A trafficking victim does not have to cross international boundaries. Trafficking can take place within Scotland, in our towns and cities as well as in rural locations.

Fife Council has developed an excellent e-learning awareness programme designed to provide staff from all agencies with a basic understanding of the issues relating to the human trafficking of children and adults.

The materials for this course have been adapted using the Scottish Government 'Human Trafficking: Reading the Signs' DVD along with information contained in other documents. Further information and guidance can be found in Scotland's Trafficking & Exploitation Strategy 2025.

Domestic Abuse Awareness Raising Tool (FVAWP Level 1 E-Learning)



Domestic Abuse Awareness Raising Tool (DAART) is available to professionals from all sectors in Fife. It is appropriate for staff induction, refresher training and will become a prerequisite for the FVAWP training programme. The DAART builds on the Domestic Abuse Matters Scotland programme developed for Police Scotland in collaboration with partners ASSIST, the Caledonian System, Sacro and Scottish Borders Safer Communities team as part of the implementation of the Domestic Abuse (Scotland) Act 2018.

The module includes:

- The definition and prevalence of Domestic Abuse
- The Domestic Abuse (Scotland) Act 2018
- General awareness and identification of Domestic Abuse, including coercive control
- Safe responses and referral pathways

It reflects real experiences of women, children, men, LGBT people and the BME community. It includes case studies that show tactics perpetrators use to manipulate victims and responders, as well as the impact of Domestic Abuse and coercive control on the whole family.

The Disclosure Scheme for Domestic Abuse Scotland (DSDAS) aims to prevent domestic abuse by giving people the right to ask about the background of their partner or giving Police Scotland the power to tell individuals that they may be at risk in their current relationship.

Becoming Trauma Informed



(Trauma Tier 1 Training & FVAWP level 1 E-Learning)

The term trauma can refer to a wide range of traumatic, abusive, or neglectful events or series of events (including Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and trauma in adulthood) that are experienced as being emotionally or physically harmful or life threatening. Whether an event(s) is traumatic depends not only on our individual experience of the event, but also how it negatively impacts on our emotional, social, spiritual, and physical wellbeing. We are all affected by traumatic events in different ways.

In summary, psychological trauma can be understood in terms of the 3 **E**'s:

- the **E**vent
- how it is **E**xperienced
- and its **E**ffects

Fife Council's Becoming Trauma Informed (Psychological Trauma Level 1 Training) E-Learning Module has been developed to **meet the needs of all employees** who could potentially come into contact with individuals who have been affected by trauma in their lives. **If you have a support role you should complete Trauma Tier 2 training page 8.**

Introduction to Child Sexual Exploitation (FVAWP Level 1 E-Learning)



Child sexual exploitation (CSE) is a type of sexual abuse. When a child or young person is exploited, they're given things, like gifts, drugs, money, status, and affection, in exchange for performing sexual activities.

CSE is a significant issue for children and young people in the UK and is more prevalent and widespread than you may think. This is in part due to the ever-growing use of technology in our communications. It is therefore highly relevant for anyone working with children, young people and families and will provide a comprehensive introduction to this challenging subject. CSE is not just something that 'other' communities have to deal with but could well be happening to children and young people that you know.

The course is a mixed media presentation which will guide you through key messages in a clear, straightforward, and interesting way. Video and audio are used to explain and illustrate important learning points making it an effective and time saving tool to help you understand more about CSE. You can work at your own pace and revisit the module as often as you like to complete your learning. On completion of the module, you will be emailed a certificate, your key course documents, as well as any notes that you took during the module, for you to keep and refer to as you wish.

Equally Safe in Practice

LEVEL 1 E-Learning

The following three e-learning ESiP modules and the competency frameworks that underpin them have been developed collaboratively by Scottish Women's Aid with local and national partners in the violence against women and girls sector. The modules form the foundations of the ESiP Framework and are Group 1 of a workforce development framework that ranges from Group 1 through to Group 6, with targeted learning for each professional level. This means these are aimed at staff across all levels, roles, and responsibilities. The modules intend to build a basic understanding of gender, gender inequality and the dynamics and impact of violence against women and girls. Learners are supported to consider what they can do within their role to respond to those affected, and how they can contribute to making their organisations and communities safer and more equal.





Equally Safe in Practice (ESiP) Together for Gender Equality (FVAWP Level 1 E-Learning)



Working towards gender equality, safety and wellbeing is everyone's business and a national priority. No matter who you are, it is your job to make our organisation and community safer and fairer for everyone regardless of gender, sexuality, age, ethnicity, or disability. By the end of this training workers can make a difference by:

- Understanding concepts of gender; definitions and terminology
- Recognising manifestations and impacts of gender inequality
- Understanding VAWG exists on a continuum, and is both a cause and consequence of women's inequality
- Understanding that organisational culture can be an obstacle or resource for tackling gender inequality
- Understanding how attitudes and actions can contribute to upholding or dismantling gender inequality and VAWG

This module will support a deeper understanding of what domestic abuse is; increase confidence in identifying controlling and abusive behaviours; consider how it impacts adult and child survivors; and how you can effectively respond to survivors and signpost them to the best support. You can make a difference by:

- Demonstrating a basic understanding of the dynamics of domestic abuse as a pattern of behaviour,
- Understanding the consequences and impact on women and children
- Being aware of barriers survivors face in accessing support
- Understanding how addressing gender inequality is key to ending domestic abuse
- Applying best practice in responding to experiences of domestic abuse

Understanding Sexual Violence

(FVAWP Level 1 E-Learning)



This course will support and prepare anyone who may encounter a disclosure of sexual violence from a client, a colleague, or if they see or hear something that worries them. You don't need to be an expert but through this learning we hope participants will be more confident to be able to recognise sexual violence and comfortable in responding to this. By the end of the training it is hoped learners will be able to:

- Define sexual violence and recognise the prevalence of this as a form of VAWG and how this links to women's inequality
- Recognise the impact of social attitudes on how individuals, services, and society deal with sexual violence
- Understand the relationship between trauma and sexual violence
- Recognise barriers survivors face in accessing support
- Apply best practice sensitively and appropriately to experiences of sexual violence

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Awareness of Forced Marriage (FVAWP Level 2 E-Learning)



A forced marriage is where one or both spouses do not (or, in the case of children / young people / adults at risk, cannot) consent to the marriage and duress is involved. Duress can include physical, psychological, financial, sexual, and emotional pressure, threatening conduct, harassment, threat of blackmail, use of deception and other means. It is also 'force' to knowingly take advantage of a person's incapacity to consent to, or understand the nature of, the marriage. Duress may be from parents, other family members and the wider Community.

The Home Office offers free training on "Awareness of Forced Marriage". The course covers what forced marriage is; who is at risk; implications; and acting upon concerns. The course is interactive throughout, and participants can select their occupation for a personalised guide on how to deal with situations in your work. Recommended for frontline workers that would like an overview of Forced Marriage. Although this relates to UK (English and Welsh specific) legislations there are links to how we would respond to this in Scotland according to Scottish specific legislation which can be accessed

Recognising and Preventing FGM (FVAWP Level 2 E-Learning)



Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) includes all procedures involving the partial or total removal of the external female genitalia or other injury to the female genital organs for non-therapeutic reasons.

It is estimated that 60,000 girls under the age of 15 are at risk of FGM in the UK and that 137,000 girls and women are living with the consequences of FGM in the UK. The number of individuals from FGM practicing communities is increasing in Scotland. Tackling FGM in Scotland.

The Home Office offers training on female genital mutation “Recognising and Preventing FGM”. The course covers what FGM is; who is most at risk; health implications; taking action and finishes with case studies to work through. Recommended for frontline workers that would like an overview of FGM, although it is targeted at England and Wales it is still very much appropriate for Scottish Staff.

Developing Your Trauma Skilled Practice

(Trauma Tier 2 Training & FVAWP Level 2 E-learning)



Being 'Trauma Informed' means being able to recognise when someone may be affected by trauma, collaboratively adjusting how we work to take this into account and responding in a way that supports recovery, does no harm, and recognises and supports people's resilience.

Being 'Trauma Informed' is underpinned by the 5 Rs:

Realising how common the experience of trauma and adversity is

Recognising the different ways that trauma can affect people

Responding by taking account of the ways that people can be affected by trauma to support recovery

Opportunities to **Resist re-traumatisation** and offer a greater sense of choice and control, empowerment, collaboration, and safety with everyone that you have contact with

Recognising the central importance of **Relationships**.

NHS Education for Scotland have a Developing Your Trauma Skilled Practice (Trauma Tier 2 Training) Module on TURAS that's a broad introduction to trauma and has lots of links to other resources. For all disciplines/staff groups (although refers to health workers at some points).

Identifying and Working with Stalking Behaviours FVAWP (Level 2 Virtual Workshop)



According to the self-completion elements of the [2019-20 Scottish Crime and Justice Survey \(SCJS\)](#), almost one-in eight adults (11.8%) experienced at least one type of stalking and harassment. Action Against Stalking carried out a survey in 2022 reporting that nearly one in four women living in Scotland has been a victim of stalking, compared to 1 in 7 men reporting being stalked.

Join Social Work's Justice Services colleagues for a discussion on how to improve knowledge and practice in working with those who display stalking behaviours and their victims.

Every Stalking case is different, however, very often perpetrators use similar tactics driven by comparable motives. The seminar aims to explore tactics, techniques and motives employed by many stalking perpetrators.

This course is suitable for anyone who might provide support to a client who is experiencing Stalking.

MARAC

(Multi-Agency Risk Assessment Conference) FVAWP (Level 2 Virtual Workshop)



A Multi Agency Risk Assessment Conference (or MARAC) is a meeting that is held to discuss the most high-risk cases of domestic abuse and sexual violence, to share information and to safety plan to safeguard a victim. The MARAC will specifically address the safeguarding needs of the adult victim but will also take into consideration any children or unborn babies. It brings together agencies who may be working with an individual but by sharing information between them, a much more informed risk assessment and safeguarding action plan can be put in place (a Risk Management Plan or RMP)

Professionals who attend may include those from Police, Social work, Health, Housing, and Women's Aid. Other organisations may also be invited to attend where relevant.

Whatever service/ organisation you work in, you will be in contact with victims of domestic abuse. This webinar will provide key information about the MARAC process, the practitioners role within this, and how to use the DASH RIC tool.

To refer an individual into MARAC a DASH Risk Checklist should be completed. If an individual scores 14 or above, they should automatically be referred into MARAC. An individual scoring less than 14 may also be referred if, in the professional's judgement, there are serious concerns that should be considered. Consent does not necessarily need to be obtained for a referral to be made.

Engaging Safely with Male Perpetrators of Domestic Abuse

FVAWP (Level 2 Virtual Workshop)



The aim is to “*Ensure that safety of women and children is the primary goal of all work with male perpetrators*” – ‘Respect’ Statement of Principles and Minimum Standards of Practice (2004)

Often, practitioners support families where Domestic Abuse is a central dynamic in the family home. While many receive comprehensive training on how to support survivors and their children impacted by Domestic Abuse, they are limited learning opportunities in working directly with the perpetrators. Understandably practitioners worry about increasing risk to women and children.

This training provides participants with an introduction and overview to engaging safely with male perpetrators of Domestic Abuse.

It also looks at tactics commonly used by perpetrators of domestic abuse and effective communication methods that could be used to engage with them.

It provides a safe space for practitioners to consider and discuss concerns, challenges, and solution for working with families experiencing domestic abuse.

Under Pressure (Zero Tolerance)

FVAWP (Level 2 Virtual Workshop)



Young People are under more pressure than ever before. Contributing factors such as social media, porn, sex, relationship, and gender roles put a worrying amount of weight on adolescents. Did you know?

- That teenagers are the most likely group to suffer from domestic abuse. The NSPCC found that a staggering 25% of girls and 18% of boys reported some form of physical partner abuse ([Source](#)).
- More people own a smartphone than a toothbrush. The youth market is the most saturated when it comes to smartphones: 85% of 18-24-year-olds have one making social media more accessible than ever before.
- 90% of 8-16 years have seen online pornography
- 15-year-olds in the UK were among the saddest and least satisfied with their lives in Europe ([Source](#)).

Under Pressure is a national training programme developed by Zero Tolerance with support from partners in YouthLink Scotland and Celcis.

The programme aims to support professionals working with young people to open discussions with them about some of the challenges and pressures they may be facing including: potential risks of grooming and sexual exploitation, negotiating online safety, engaging in healthy consent-based relationships, and dealing with the pressures to conform to idealised models of 'how to be' men and women. It also takes participants through an introduction to gender and gender-based abuse.

Disclosure Scheme for Domestic Abuse Scotland (DSDAS)

FVAWP – Virtual Workshop (Level 2)



The Fife Violence Against Women Partnership are holding an information/training session about the Disclosure Scheme for Domestic Abuse Scotland (DSDAS) which Police Scotland introduced in October 2015.

The Disclosure Scheme for Domestic Abuse Scotland (DSDAS) gives people the right to ask about the background of their partner. It also allows concerned relatives, friends, and practitioners the right to ask about someone's partner. They can ask if the partner has been abusive in the past.

DSDAS also gives Police Scotland the power to tell people that they may be at risk of domestic abuse. This information can be given even if it is not asked for, therefore enabling the person potentially at risk to make informed choices about whether they remain in their current/new relationship or not.

It is never disclosed to the potential victim about who made the application for disclosure so there is no repercussions to your relationship with that person.

Please join us at one of our short sessions to find out more about the scheme including the process of making an application, and the steps that Police Scotland take in partnership with others. **This is a preventative and protective measure that could help save lives.**

In Fife in 2025/26 Police Scotland (**Fife division**) recorded 5,164 incidents of domestic abuse. However, we know that this is a massively under-reported issue and that on average a woman will be assaulted approx. 35 times before reporting it to the police.

Impact of Domestic Abuse in the Early Years

FVAWP – In-person training (Level 2)



Children's experience of domestic abuse can cause both short and long term cognitive, behavioural, and emotional effects, and impact on attachment. Each child will respond differently to the trauma of witnessing domestic abuse depending on a range of factors including, but not limited to, sex, race, culture, age, and stage of development.

Domestic abuse is also often seen as an attack on the mother-child relationship, and therefore affects attachment and impacts on positive parenting strategies.

Join the FVAWP and CEDAR (Family Support Service) to explore the impact that domestic abuse can have in the early years.

MARAC

(Multi-Agency Risk Assessment Conference)

FVAWP (Level 2)



A Multi Agency Risk Assessment Conference (or MARAC) is a meeting that is held to discuss the most high-risk cases of domestic abuse and sexual violence, to share information and to safety plan to safeguard a victim. The MARAC will specifically address the safeguarding needs of the adult victim but will also take into consideration any children or unborn babies. It brings together agencies who may be working with an individual but by sharing information between them, a much more informed risk assessment and safeguarding action plan can be put in place (a Risk Management Plan or RMP)

Professionals who attend may include those from Police, Social work, Health, Housing, and Women's Aid. Other organisations may also be invited to attend where relevant.

Whatever service/ organisation you work in, you will be in contact with victims of domestic abuse. This webinar will provide key information about the MARAC process, the practitioners role within this, and how to effectively use the robust DASH RIC tool.

To refer an individual into MARAC a DASH Risk Checklist should be completed. If an individual scores 14 or above, they should automatically be referred into MARAC. An individual scoring less than 14 may also be referred if, in the professional's judgement, there are serious concerns that should be considered. Consent does not necessarily need to be obtained for a referral to be made.

Domestic Abuse and the Protection of Children FVAWP – In-person training (Level 2)



In the 2023-24 time period 16.5% of children referred to Children's Reporter in Scotland had domestic abuse as the primary concern. In Fife this was 7% Just as every child's experience of domestic abuse is different, every child will be affected differently. Factors like age, stage, personality, and how they're seen by the abusing and non-abusing parent will all impact on this. The impact of domestic abuse on a child should be understood as a consequence of the perpetrator choosing to abuse rather than the non-abusing parent's/carer's failure to protect.

Participants explore the complexities of domestic abuse and steps involved in keeping children and young people safe from harm and recognising the impact of perpetrators coercive behaviour on adult and child victims. Participants are briefly introduced to the Safe & Together approach, which focuses on harm to children, supporting the non-abusing parent and holding the perpetrator to account. It is designed to support and enhance practice alongside existing child protection guidelines and GIRFEC (getting it right for every child) obligations.

See Me, Not My Mask

(Supporting Adult Survivors of Childhood Sexual Abuse)
FVAWP – In-person training (Level 2)



The World Health Organisation stated that 20% of women and 5% of men were sexually abused as children. Only a small percentage of sexual crimes against children are ever detected, recorded, or prosecuted. Most perpetrators do not admit their actions, and many survivors do not wish to disclose their experiences. Adults who disclose historical childhood sexual abuse should be able to do so in confidence and be provided with the help and support that they need. The adult may require help and support from professionals. It is important that practitioners feel equipped to respond to a disclosure from a survivor in a manner they deserve and know where to signpost to.

Join experienced staff from KASP for this multi-agency training opportunity which offers an increased understanding around the complexities of disclosure and, how those affected may react or respond during disclosure. By the end of the training, the aims are that you will have:

- A better understanding of the impact of Childhood Sexual Abuse
- A deeper understanding of effects on survivors

CEDAR Co-facilitation Training

FVAWP – In-person training (Level 2)



Fife Cedar Plus values the diverse backgrounds and skills facilitators bring. Specific experience with children, young people, or adults is not required to co-facilitate groups. Each facilitator's unique contribution is essential to the success of the CEDAR and EYDAR programmes.

However, facilitators must support a gender-based analysis of domestic abuse, and be able to commit to delivering at least one term as a cofacilitator to complete this training (this must be approved by your manager).

Aim:

Facilitating Fife Cedar Plus groups offers staff the chance to build new skills and strengthen collaboration between local voluntary and statutory services. It also deepens understanding of the causes and impacts of domestic abuse, particularly on women, children, and the mother-child relationship, giving facilitators a valuable insight into the dynamics and effects of domestic abuse through the group work process.

Outcomes:

Participants will develop into effective facilitators—able to guide discussions, resolve conflicts, and maintain a safe, positive group environment that supports learning and collaboration. This involves helping the group clarify its purpose, goals, challenges, and available resources and supports women, children, and young people in their recovery from their own experiences of domestic abuse.

Mentors In Violence Prevention (MVP)

FVAWP – In-person training (Level 2)



Mentors in Violence Prevention is a peer education programme which challenges the attitudes, beliefs and values that underpin gender-based violence. It is currently delivered within schools by senior pupils who are trained up to be mentors. The programme uses an active creative bystander approach to empower pupils and school staff to challenge these attitudes and behaviours in a safe way.

This one-day session is for community partners who would like to support delivery of this programme in Fife schools or in the community alongside teachers and other trainers.

MVP has the potential to positively affect the culture and ethos of our learning environments, making them safer, more inclusive and welcoming places for all young people. Modelling of the behaviours and values associated with MVP, by the mentor support team staff, is key to an authentic experience for the mentors.

Young people examine violence through a gendered lens, becoming aware of societal biases and developing leadership skills to apply 'active bystander' theory. They explore different forms of violence and are encouraged to challenge victim blaming.

The programme covers behaviours such as physical violence, name-calling, sexting, coercive control, and harassment. Rather than labelling individuals as victims or perpetrators, it empowers them to support and challenge peers while staying safe themselves.

Safe and Together CORE Training



Safe and Together is an evidence-based model which focuses on harm to children and supports the non-abusing parent in cases of domestic abuse. This child centred model identifies harm to children, as well as protective and resilience factors. It looks at the facts of the case including behavioural patterns of the perpetrator, protective efforts of the non-abusing parent and how these interrelate and looks specifically at the adverse impact on the children. It is designed to support and enhance practice and will be used alongside existing child protection guidelines and GIRFEC obligations. The aim of this course is for participants to develop a greater awareness and understanding of the nature and scope of domestic abuse, its impact and consequences and its intersections with child safety, wellbeing, and protection through the Safe and Together approach.

Domestic Abuse informed practice requires competencies in assessment, interviewing, documentation, and case planning. Safe and Together Institute's CORE Training offers 4 modules of training covering each of these foundational skills.

The training will be delivered either using a blended approach of webinars and e-learning content, or as a 4-day in person course. Please note the certification of completion will be given after participants pass the online assessment.

The course is suitable for professionals working directly with families affected by Domestic abuse including practitioners from Health, Education, Social Work and Third Sector Organisations.
