# **North East Fife Area Anti-Poverty Fund** – Reporting on 2019/20 Spend and Request for Approval of 2020/21 areas of spending

### Purpose

Reporting on the spending of the Anti-Poverty Funds 2019/20.

To seek approval of members for the spend of the £135,000 of the North East Fife Anti-Poverty funding 2020/21.

### Recommendation(s)

That Committee:

- 1. Note the actual spend of the 2019/20 budget and outcomes achieved NEF Anti-Poverty Fund Action Plan attached (Appendix 1)
- 2. Approve the spending of the funding across the identified areas of work outlined in the report
- 3. Note the continued targeting of spend on discretionary payments for bus travel, white goods and furniture and emergency fuel top ups to address the needs that current welfare reforms are creating
- 4. Note the spend on the Development Officer (Community Planning) from Anti-Poverty funds to tackle food insecurity and transportation issues in NEF

### **Resource Implications**

The Anti-Poverty budget for North East Fife for 2019/20 is £135,000.

### Legal & Risk Implications

There are no legal implications. There is a risk that taking no action to address the impact of poverty will result in poorer outcomes for residents in the North East Fife area.

#### Impact Assessment

An EqIA is not required because the report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies or practices. Any projects or initiatives undertaken in supporting the anti-poverty work will carry out EqIAs where appropriate.

### Consultation

Members of the North East Fife Anti-Poverty partnership have been fully involved in considering the evaluation of current projects and proposing the actions in this report. The membership includes:-

 East Home Start, Fife Council Family Support, Fife Young Carers, Families First, Cupar, East Neuk, St Andrews and Tay Bridgehead Foodbanks, NHS Fife Health Improvement, Families Support, Castle Furniture, Fife Forum, Fife Council Childcare Services, St Andrews Environmental Network, Department of Work & Pensions, Citizens Advice & Rights Fife, Fife Voluntary Action, Fife Council Housing Services, Social Work and Communities and Neighbourhoods.

### 1.0 Background

- 1.1 An amount of £135,000 has been devolved to North East Fife for Anti-Poverty work in 2020-21.
- 1.2 At its meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> March 2019 the Area Committee gave delegated powers to continue work across the themes identified in the action plan including the targeting of funding on discretionary payments for bus travel in emergency situations and emergency food and fuel payments.
- 1.3 This forward planning ensured discretionary payments could be made to help tackle the issue of waiting periods before Universal Credit is paid (sometimes for as long as an 8 week period) and the impact of deductions made from benefit that can be taken for arrears and debts which frequently leaves people with 30 % below UC benefit levels. People are supported to apply for payments from the Scottish Welfare Fund but there are an increasing number of cases where people are not eligible for help or require more financial help to cover these circumstances. The impact of the Benefit Cap ( the limit on the total amount of benefit those aged 16 to 64 can get ) being extended to cover not just the housing costs but total level of benefit,has also led to an increase in the number of people who find themselves needing this type of support. In terms of the benefit cap this is impacting on families with 3 or more children the most. The losses for this group are considerable and often over £50 per month.
- 1.4 In 2019/20 the discretionary payments made by Welfare Support Workers to individuals amounted to £7000 benefitting around 215 people with an average payment of just over £32. These payments have been used for bus travel costs and food.
- 1.5 We partner with Fife Voluntary Action to offer help for one off higher value awards for people setting up home and other emergency situations . They have administered payments of £5000 to 45 clients from 13 referring agencies. The majority of the spend at nearly £4500 is for white goods, furniture and fuel top ups. This averages to just over £100 per payment.
- 1.6 Feedback from those benefitting from discretionary payments :

"I have bipolar and was going through a bad time both financially and mentally. The help and advice received got me through this. It is the first time I have ever needed or received this type of help. I am 56 and have raised 6 children so feel now I am glad I was confident enough to ask for a little help." " I wouldn't have been able to have to get to my appointment for Employment Support Allowance ESA assessment which was on a Sunday morning in Dundee at 9 am . I hadn't got the £8.30 bus fare and had to get there."

*"I have been able to visit my Mum in hospital in Dunfermline – I wouldn't have got this bus fare back as I was not the person with an appointment at the hospital. There is no help for relative visiting patients in hospital. "* 

- 1.7 The Anti Poverty Group is able to identify emerging need and trends and act quickly to ensure staff and those impacted by changes, have up to date information and are well equipped to be able to cope and informed. The group plans and delivers responses often contributing case studies and to briefings that the Council develops and national bodies such as COSLA and Child Poverty Action Plan collect and note.
- 1.8 The Anti Poverty group promotes a greater understanding of people's individual circumstances by sharing case studies and through this they are able to ensure as many workers and agencies can signpost and refer to specialised help as possible. In the last 12 months links have been made with community midwives and staff have provided briefings at social work team meetings in order to connect and inform the widest possible group of people who are in contact with those impacted by welfare changes. The Anti Poverty Group has had briefings directly from the Department of Works and Pensions (DWP) and from the staff at Social Security Scotland.
- 1.9 A crisis tool is being developed to help aid this further and training is to continue to be offered on mental health first aid and poverty awareness. In Cupar a mental health action group is mapping all provision and identifying gaps. There is a significant increase noted by all agencies of the mental health pressures people are facing due to recent benefit changes and the social prescribing project again in Cupar is helping provide additional help to those with mild to moderate mental health issues. There have been 60 people referred to this part time provision 42 females and 18 males .Comments have included,

"Having just someone to talk to has made all the difference "

"Having the confidence to go to adult education classes has really helped me move on "

1.10 There has been a focus on raising the capacity of communities to respond to needs they are identifying in their area and the creation of the Development Officer (Community Planning) post and the associated challenge fund for both transport and food insecurity work, will help support communities to take forward projects quickly. Access to services remains a challenge in NEF. The latest SIMD data has shown an increase in the number of people who are deemed access deprived. This means people are travelling further to access basic services such as a GP, chemist, school or shop. This raised from 37% to 41.7 % between 2016 and 2020.

The development trusts, community councils and community centres are able to respond to the identified need and this worker will work closely with these organisations and the community centres across North East Fife to find local solutions.

1.11 At the Anti-Poverty meeting of the 24<sup>th</sup> January 2020 the partners discussed the issues facing people living in poverty in North East Fife and came up with the priorities below for work for 2020/21:

- Ensuring delivery of mitigation measures and monitoring of the impact of welfare changes to include rolling out further training on poverty awareness and mental health first aid and collecting case studies
- Development of a local crisis tool to help agencies and services signpost and get specialised help to those needing it
- Continuing the Discretionary Fund payments budget as they are often a lifeline to those in crisis
- Feeding families during holidays and building on the success of Café Inc initiative
- Extension of provision addressing holiday hunger to include older young people 11- 18 year olds
- Support for the Toy Drive
- Support for initiatives addressing fuel poverty
- Addressing social isolation and ensuring families are able to have days out and extending this to include funding for trips for job club users who also have few opportunities for days out due to low income
- Support for young people to have chances to access training locally and group work supporting them into employment
- Funding to support befriending and support for those experiencing mental health issues

# 2.0 Recommended Areas of Work 2020/2021

2.1 All allocations are notional amounts which will be finalised based on the evaluations of initiatives 2019/20 and evidence of need in NEF:

### • Fuel Poverty £10,000

Back on Track **£3000** – project targets private rented and owner occupied households who are in fuel poverty. This work is provided by Cosy Kingdom Energy Advisors and is in addition to the support provided for council housing tenants

Healthy Homes **£7000** – Continuing buying and distributing goods to help with fuel poverty such as curtains, drying clothes airers, LED light bulbs.

- Holiday Activities Fund £15,500 Holiday activities for targeted young people and families including healthy food where possible and targeted to those potentially in crisis over the school holidays.
- Young Peoples' Employability Opportunities £5000 Training and cost of accessing training for young people across NEF
- Food Insecurity £17,000

Young People £2000 Work to support 11- 18 year olds holiday hunger

Funding for food insecurity and transportation work **£15,000** – start up costs of additional community fridges, meals and larder bulk buy initiatives

• Christmas Provision £3000 – support for homeless, vulnerable and elderly. Work with third sector to provide meals and opportunities for company over Xmas. Includes support for the Social Work annual toy drive.

- **Discretionary Fund £25,000** provides what referring agencies assess can't be provided elsewhere and is necessary for our most vulnerable and disadvantaged individuals and families to help them out of crisis
- **Project Staff £41,500** Ongoing staffing costs are not provided from this fund but staff costs can be funded in order to kick start new work in the area or help to be able to pilot work that can then seek other funding. Funding for staff posts for a further 12 months is sought by

Homestart **£5000** to continue work with helping those impacted by the Benefit Cap

Fife Young Carers £9722 and the

Development Officer post **£26,778** (Community Planning ) for advancing food insecurity and transportation issues.

• **Befriending £15,000** Funds for taking forward befriending and support for those experiencing mental health issues.

Total £135 000

# 3.0 Conclusions

3.1 The recommendation is to deliver the projects listed above and to continue monitoring the progress and evaluation of the work with the Anti-Poverty Group. The group is made up of the partners who work with those who receive the support and we are able to offer and have witnessed the immediate and longer term results of the interventions.
