2380	KIMBERLEY (FORMER PARISH SCHOOL) 33 MAIN STREET, CERES INCLUDING GARDEN WALLS	Late 18th century repaired 1829 and later. Schoolhouse 2-storey 3-window with single-storey 2-window schoolroom at higher level, continuous roofline, droved coursed rubble, slated, moulded chimney copes.	B	
2363	3 KIRK BRAE CERES PARISH CHURCH (FORMERLY MAIN STREET) CERES	Dated JC 1806 (probably for John Corstorphine architect-builder of Kingsbarns) at door lintel. Originally: rectangular plan, 2-storey 3-window treatment of flanks, ground floor openings in arched recesses west side, 2 arched windows (reglazed) N gable, piended roof; square tower south gable, 3 narrow round-arched openings each face, crenellated parapet and obelisk pinnacles. South and west fronts droved ashlar, remainder rubble. External appearance subsequently modified, octagonal drum and stone spire added 1851-2, Hugh Birrell of Drumeldrie architect, outer openings of original belfry stage built up on George Rae's advice; considerable repairs 1853; Hugh Birrell; piends of roof removed and gables built John Milne of St Andrews 1865. Interior: U-plan gallery on timber Roman doric columns (additional 4 inserted in accordance with original plan in 1829) swagged frieze, original table pews and pulpit, restored I G Lindsay. Glazing mainly original. 15th century recumbent effigy in vestibule.	B

Harled and white-washed with black painted margins. Partly reglazed.	B

2401	PREMISES (D KITCHING) ANSTRUTHER ROAD, CERES	Late 18th century. Single-storey 2-window and centre door former cottage with outhouse, rubble-built, chamfered margin to door, steading or workshop wing with piended roof; pantiled.	C	

2402	WAR MEMORIAL HALL, ANSTRUTHER ROAD, CERES	1798 as Relief Meeting House, converted to hall and porch added at NW gable 1920. Plain 2-window gabled rectangle, harled, moulded skew ends with small scrolls urn finials; reglazed 19th century; small session house with modern addition SE gable; further addition 1972.	B	
2403	OLD MANSE, ANSTRUTHER ROAD, CERES	Dated 1789 at skew ends. Built as Relief Manse, 2-storey 3-window droved ashlar and slate. Small 1 door 1 window rubble and pantile wing.	B	
2373	CASTLEGATE FARM, CASTLEGATE, CERES	18th and early 19th century. Irregular row, single-storey rubble partly with droved dressings, pantiled 4-pane frontage.	C

Symmetrical 2-storey 5-window coursed droved rubble with margins, wide (evidently re-used) pedimented doorpiece with fluted Ionic pilasters, forestair at north gable; pantiled, moulded eaves course, skewputts; later single-storey stable wing, also pantiled. 

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

Small single-storey and laigh floor (full 2-storey at back) 1 door 1 window rubble and stone slate, scrolled skewputts; overdoor panel depicting scales and superscribed 'God bless the just'; by the door hangs a pair of jougs.</p> <p>(2) Pair of cottages to south of above, single-storey to front, 2-storey to back; northern house 2-window and centre door with (re-used) 17 AB MB 10 lintel, rubble with margins; southern house 3-window and door (between 1st and 2nd) rubble with droved dressings, lean-to at gable; open lean-to pentice along rear elevation of both buildings (modern reconstruction); pantiled throughout.</p>	A	 <p>(1)</p>

2393	SOUTHERN OUTBUILDING OF BRAND'S HOTEL, HIGH STREET, CERES	Dated IS M(?) 1744 and 17 IS 76 Beer store in 19th century but evidently originally a meal mill. 2-storey rubble and pantile with crowstepped gable to Ceres Burn, east part is slightly later addition.	A	
2392	BRAND'S HOTEL, HIGH STREET, CERES INCLUDING NORTH-WEST WING	17th century, much altered. Single storey (2 at back to Ceres Burn) rubble and pantile, front cemented and lined with margins, early 19th century slated lean-to outshot with railed steps, porch added later still; pantiled outbuilding at back. 4294	HIGH STREET, KIRPHON	Dated IS IB 1744 at keyblock of doorpiece. Much altered and modernised. Small single-storey (2 at back to Ceres Burn) stuccoed and lined with margins; back completely reconstructed; pantiled.	C

17th century. 2-storey rubble and slate, crowstepped skew gable to St Andrew's Road, much altered fenestration to Ceres Burn. Between this house and Kirphon is a 17th century skewputt with a sculptured head.



2409	BOW BUTTS BRIDGE - BANNOCKBURN MONUMENT	1914. Granite. Octagonal shaft with sculptured gothic head set on stepped base. Commemorates 600th anniversary of Bannockburn.	C	
2376	HOUSE (A D MITCHELL) NORTH CROFTDYKE, CERES	Reconstructed earlier 19th century. Single-storey and attic, 3-window and door (between 1st and 2nd) coursed rubble with droved dressings, slated, 2 canted dormers.	C	

2377	HOUSE (J W MITCHELL) NORTH CROFTDYKE, CERES	Late 18th century. 2-storey 3-window coursed rubble, droved freestone dressings, random rubble gables, slated; screen wall and side gate.	C

2411	HOUSE (DAVID KIDD) SOUTH CROFTDYKE CERES	Late 18th century, altered. Single-storey 2-window and centre door, modern dry-dash harl with painted margins, pantiled; reglazed.	C
