## **Collydean has it say!**

As part of an ongoing Fife wide review of Fife Council lock ups, Housing Services and Transportation are aiming to reduce any low demand or poor condition stock and improve the condition where there is high demand. This will improve the aesthetic of estates for tenants and residents within the area as well as safer neighbourhoods.

Housing Services worked with Transportation to carry out analysis of the lock ups in the Glenrothes area looking at those with an occupancy rate of 30% and below. Several sites were identified within the Collydean area for consideration and approval.

Consultation regarding lock ups was carried out within Collydean, with Heather Path residents first to have their say on local improvements. Housing Management Officer, Michelle Dunn, organised a survey in the local community and sought opinions and ideas from residents on the lock-ups and what they felt they would like to see in their community.

The survey response was very positive with the overwhelming suggestion for removing the garages in favour of parking.

Heather Path was the first demolition of the Collydean area, with work commencing January 2022 and finishing February 2022. Works then progressed to Dunlin Avenue, Piper Drive and then Brent Place, all lock ups identified for local survey and improvement.

Effective partnership working between Roads & Transportation, and Housing Services allowed for a smooth and quick turnaround, and all works within the Collydean area were completed by 25th March 2022.

The general appearance of the local community is much improved, the unsightly lock ups are now gone and replaced with fresh parking bays for more cars and better pathways.

A huge thanks to all residents in Heather Path for their help-your voice can make a difference in your local area.

# Improving Levenmouth Together – Tackling Anti-Social Behaviour

As the local Community Policing Inspector for Levenmouth, I am committed to improving the lives and wellbeing of people, places and communities across the area. I am acutely aware of the ongoing anti-social behaviour across Levenmouth, and I am working tirelessly with my policing team and our wider partner network to reduce issues in our communities.

I launched the Improving Levenmouth Together programme on 1st April 2022. Two Police Officers, funded by Fife Council and Police Scotland, are dedicated to tackling anti-social behaviour across the Levenmouth communities.

The two officers are responsible for the prevention of anti-social behaviour, tackling offenders, and also looking to divert offenders from committing crime in the future.

Improving Levenmouth Together is a group of partners, led by Police Scotland, working collectively to improve the lives and wellbeing of people, places and communities across Levenmouth.

The project has been in place since 2019 and has led to a 70% reduction in calls to Police Scotland relating to anti-social behaviour in Levenmouth, between 2018 and 2021.

Between 1st April 2021 and 31st October 2021, the dedicated enforcement team, worked both reactively and pro-actively and achieved the following results;

- 36 vehicles seized this includes motorbikes, cars and a quads.
- 311 people charged in connection with anti-social behaviour and road traffic offences.
- 5 drug search warrants executed. Quantity of drugs recovered.
- 4 Stolen vehicles recovered.

We have recently responded to reports of anti-social behaviour in the area of Steelworks Brae with targeted patrols, along with Safer Communities Community Officers, Scottish Fire and Rescue Service and Clued Up. I also deployed a mobile CCTV van, which had an impact. Calls and reports have reduced in this time period.

I would encourage anyone experiencing anti-social behaviour to contact Police Scotland to report the matter, so I can ensure appropriate resources are deployed to deal with the issue.

I hope to have CCTV cameras in the local communities in the coming months, which will assist in deterring people committing disorder or crime.

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## **Levenmouth Area Housing Plan**

In the Spring edition of Down Your Street we asked people to complete the Levenmouth Area Housing Plan Survey. The purpose of the survey was to help the area team develop an action plan over the next three years.

You might have met the tenant participation team out and about in Levenmouth asking for your opinion or had a discussion with your Housing Management Officer about the survey. We received a total of 192 responses from residents across the whole of Levenmouth. It's important for Housing to have your views when shaping the future of the Service, we can target the issues that matter in your area and make the improvements you'd like to see.

Once the analysis of the feedback has been completed, a revised area housing plan will be presented for approval at area committee in the summer and thereafter will be adopted. Although the analysis has not been completely reviewed, common issues include, lack of parking, lack of affordable housing and anti-social behaviour.

The plan, once approved, will be available for viewing on Fife Council's website fife.gov.uk

## **Fuel Poverty Advice**

The Home Heating Advice Fund seeks to provide financial relief to energy consumers who are experiencing significant financial hardship and strives to provide this support to households regardless of the fuel or payment method used. That is, the project is inclusive of: users of prepayment meters, district heating networks and unregulated fuels. Over the last quarter we have been able to assist those in crisis and have managed to secure around £55,000 of financial assistance across Fife.

The fund has now been extended until 31st March 2023, or until funds have been exhausted. Applications can be made online at www.homeheatingadvice. scot or the "household application route" at www.homeheatingadvice.scot. Individuals who make

applications through the 'household application' form, must supply evidence of having received energy and / or money advice from an accredited agency.

CISWO has launched a new £200 grant to support vulnerable former coal miners with the rise in fuel costs in 2022. The scheme has been launched to provide some support towards combatting the hike in the energy price cap. The one-off grant is now available for people on a low income who meet certain eligibility criteria. One grant is available per household. With former miners often suffering from health issues, mobility problems, and managing on low incomes, they may be disproportionately impacted by the price rises. ## Make way for new parking in Moir Court!

Moir Court in Kelty will soon benefit from more parking after a recent area walk about with Housing Management Officer Nicola McInally.

This area was highlighted to the housing team and local councillors by many residents during the recent walkabouts. The main reasons for this were due to inadequate parking that had become more of an issue over the years and was now resulting in vehicles being parked on grass verges potentially causing hazards to pedestrians.

Initially when Moir Court was built there were less cars on the road therefore not a high demand for parking facilities, over the years this has changed with many households and visitors now having vehicles resulting in a need for an increase of suitable parking.

Housing Management Officer Nicola decided to put forward proposals for more parking after highlighting the issues raised and is thrilled that work is now due to take place to revamp this area. The works planned will see the addition of 13 extra parking bays which will hopefully improve the issues many residents and visitors are experiencing.

Planning is underway and work is due to be completed very soon. We look forward to providing an update in future editions.



As a TRA our main objective is to build relationships not only with our residents but also within other organisations and council departments and form a useful bridge linking everyone. It is our quest to ensure our community continues to be a safe and pleasant place to live. We will campaign for changes that will enhance our community and strive to put on events that will promote community involvement.

Our Tenants and Residents Association had a number of projects in the pipeline when COVID brought everything to a halt. We were delighted when we could finally restart our meetings in February and pick up where we had left off.

The Brucefield area had been earmarked for a very generous grant from the Coalfields Regeneration Trust charity. ## **Social Security Scotland**

At Social Security Scotland, we want to ensure that everyone gets the payments they are entitled to. We do that by offering a variety of ways people can apply for benefits – including online, by phone or face-to-face and have colleagues available to help in all local authority areas across Scotland. We currently deliver twelve benefits for people on low incomes, carers, families and disabled people. Our newest benefit is Adult Disability Payment – which has been introduced as a pilot in Dundee, Perth & Kinross and the Western Isles. The payment will be delivered in Fife from 25 July ahead of national rollout on 29 August. Adult Disability Payment replaces Personal Independence Payment in Scotland, previously delivered by the Department for Work and Pensions.

We also support families on low incomes with a series of family payments. Scottish Child Payment provides financial support to families with children under six. The payment is £20 per week per child and will be extended by the end of 2022 to all eligible children under the age of 16. It will also increase to £25 per child per week at the end of the 2022.

## Walter Hay Court TRA – Walkabout

After nearly three years, due to Coronavirus restrictions, the TRA had their first walkabout, which was really well attended.

A walkabout is where a Tenants and Residents Association invites staff from various council departments and partner organisations to meet onsite and "walkabout" the estate to see first-hand the issues or problems that residents are experiencing. Everyone then works together to identify solutions and have these topics addressed successfully.

Some of the issues identified in Walter Hay Court were potholes, additional fencing, uneven pavements, missing ridge tile on a roof and gutters needing cleaned out. Liza Shearer, Housing Management Officer took notes of the issues and produced the walkabout action plan, which gets shared with the TRA and updated at the monthly TRA meetings, to see who the main contact person is for a particular issue, costs, timescales etc.

Hopefully we will see these issues addressed soon and might even do a follow-up article to update you on the progress.

CLEAR's Community Gardens & Community Workshop

Local charity CLEAR runs green and vibrant community gardens in both Buckhaven and Methil. The Buckhaven Garden is in Omar Crescent (entrance between nos. 14-16) and the Methil Garden at Kirkland Drive (at the end of the cul de sac nearest Methil Brae entrance between nos. 24-26. They are open every Wednesday and Thursday from 9.30-3.30 with a number of local residents joining in the activities.

Look out for lively open days held at both gardens. The next is planned at Methil Garden on Sat 25th June from 11-2 with free food, music, kids games, plants sales and other activities.

Elsewhere, CLEAR runs a community workshop at 47 Sandwell Street, Buckhaven recycling and repairing bikes, carrying out woodwork as well as a food kitchen producing jams, juices and similar. The workshop is also open Wednesday and Thursdays and there are volunteering opportunities too.

We hope the free £50 bike repair scheme will be resuming by the end of June and the bike workshop will be open Thursdays to Saturday each week

#### **Buckhaven's Dinosaur Murals**

The second phase of Buckhaven's striking dinosaur mural has been belatedly

completed at the Shore St/Anderson Lane site. Flying pteradons, triceratops and a Jurassic landscape have been added to the scary T-rex and is already drawing visitors

The mural has turned two depressing concrete walls, the remains of demolished flats built in the late 1960s, into an asset as part of a wider programme to enhance the Buckhaven's neglected Foreshore led by CLEAR with Council support. The spring bulbs, archways and soon, additional heritage panels will add to the trim trail, benches and picnic tables recently installed along with the improved path and selective tree planting and totems to enhance the location's appeal of this fabulous coastal location.

The Jurassic theme can educate as well as fire the imagination of a younger audience.

"The site looks out over the Forth `ring of fire', the circle of extinct volcanoes (Bass Rock, Berwick Law, Arthurs Seat, Largo Law etc) clearly visible so the landscape in earlier times can be easily imagined. The dystopian menace conveyed can prompt awareness of the impending risks of climate change which, if not controlled, could return our planet to a state before humans destroyed it."

## A new chapter begins for the North East Fife Tenants and Residents

North East Fife Tenants and Residents Federation recently moved into their new high street shop at number 19 Crossgate, Cupar. "I was very privileged to be asked to open the new Community Voice in Cupar. This is a great example of community action by tenants for tenants, to help those struggling with sustaining their housing, fuel bills and rent payments in particular. I wish the federation every success for the future."

The shop has been set up as a drop-in centre where tenants and residents of North East Fife can seek advice to tackle their concerns, from tenancy issues, anti-social behaviour complaints, and budgeting concerns with the cost-of-living crisis.

In addition to the welcoming front shop, there is also a general meeting room with an office workspace and a private committee room situated at the back.

Sustainable Cupar has been most supportive of the shop, and they will be available to offer energy advice to cut bills and reduce carbon emissions in North East Fife. The Federation would like the premises to be utilised by other like-minded community groups, so please contact the federation to discuss this opportunity.

## Homes worth the wait in Inverkeithing!

The 6th May 2022 saw the first year anniversary of the handover of the first 11 Fife Council new build properties on the Spencer Fields site in Inverkeithing. So far a total of 36 properties have now been completed out of the total of 74.

These new properties are a mix of 2, 3 and 4 bed houses, 4 in a block flats and amenity bungalows and will provide new homes for many households in housing need.

Maryann had lived in Fraser Avenue for 19 years. She raised 3 children in various flats throughout the street, moving because of fires, overcrowding and demolition. She had previously been offered a property on the old Fraser Avenue site by Kingdom Housing when Fife Council took the decision to demolish the street but decided to wait for a Fife Council property. In 2021 Maryann and her family moved to a Fife Council new

build at Gorse Wynd, Inverkeithing, built by Taylor Wimpey.

Maryanne was allocated a 4 bedroom house due to the size of her family and she still can't believe the amount of space she has in her new home. She said that because her children all have their own rooms now after years of sharing, they fight less and get on better. They also now have room for a dining table in the kitchen so they eat together rather than eating whilst watching TV.

Maryann now has her own garden that she enjoys looking after and relaxing in during the summer months and she notices how quiet it is compared to the noise of Fraser Avenue in its heyday. She does say it was a long time coming but well worth the wait as she loves her new home

#### Thinking of leaving us?

When you provide notice that you wish to terminate your Fife Council tenancy, we will contact you to arrange a suitable date and time we can visit and carry out an exit check at your property. We will also provide you with a copy of the expected 'Termination Standards' and a 'Useful Guide' summarising important information to assist when ending your tenancy.

It is important that you provide access for an 'exit check' as this is an opportunity for you and your Housing Options Officer to discuss any repairs or decoration requiring attention. This provides you the opportunity to repair or replace any damaged or missing items.

If not, this work may be carried out by Fife Council and recharged to you when you leave your tenancy.

#### Benefits for the customer:

- Outgoing customers are made aware of any repairs/decoration requiring their attention rather than face a recharge bill which will include an admin charge and VAT.
- Opportunity to ask any questions relating to the termination process and to be reminded of the date/time keys are to be in.
- Agree if any blinds/floorcoverings, white goods etc that are in good condition can be left which may benefit the future tenant.

#### **Benefits for Fife Council:**

- Checking for adaptations, property layout etc for the next allocation.
- Opportunity to reinforce the exit standards, highlight any repairs requiring attention and address any queries relating to the termination process.

#### **HomeSwap**

The Fife Housing Register's online mutual exchange match up service. We have a new HomeSwap site to make it easier to find matches and improve your chances of finding a swap. Anyone that had an advert

on our original HomeSwap is encouraged to set up a new advert to make the most of this housing option.

If you only recently decided that you wish to move and you haven't thought about a mutual exchange, we encourage you to consider this now.

may be able to provide some assistance to you. Please speak with your Housing Options Officer if you are unable to move home because of the costs involved.

We recently updated our Transfer Incentive Scheme policy to make it more attractive to you.

The scheme is aimed towards tenants living in large properties who have spare bedrooms, and who could move to a smaller, more suitable property.

We are offering an enhanced financial package to encourage downsizing, allowing much-needed larger homes to be allocated to families who need them or if you have a property that is in high demand that is rarely available. For example, one which has been adapted





## Lemon sponge cake

#### Ingredients

- 175g unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for the tin
- 175g golden caster sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 3 large unwaxed lemons, zested, plus 4-4 ½ tbsp juice
- 250g self-raising flour
- ½ tsp baking powder
- 100g Greek yoghurt
- 400g icing sugar
- lemon zest or candied peel, to serve (optional)

#### **METHOD**

#### STEP 1

Heat oven to 170C/150C fan/gas 3. Butter a deep, loose-bottomed, 18cm cake tin and line the base with baking parchment.

#### STEP 2

Beat the butter and caster sugar together with an electric whisk until fluffy and pale in colour. Crack the eggs in one at a time, beating well after each addition, then stir in the lemon zest. Fold in the flour, baking powder and ½ tsp salt, then fold in the yoghurt.

Spoon the mixture into the lined tin, smoothing the top with a spatula. Bake in the centre of the oven for 50-55 mins, or until golden brown. Cool in the tin for 10 mins before turning out onto a wire rack to cool completely.

When you're ready to decorate, sieve the icing sugar into a bowl and beat in enough lemon juice to create a thick icing. Set the cake on a serving plate or cake stand, then spoon over the icing.

#### **Tasty Mediterranean** chicken salad

Ingredients

#### Marinade/Dressing:

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- juice of 1 lemon (1/4 cup fresh squeezed lemon juice)
- 2 tablespoons water
- 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons fresh chopped parsley
- 2 teaspoons dried basil
- 2 teaspoons garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon salt
- cracked pepper, to taste
- 1 pound (500 g) skinless, boneless chicken thigh fillets (or chicken breasts)

#### Salad:

- 4 cups Romaine (or Cos) lettuce leaves, washed and dried
- 1 large cucumber diced
- 2 Roma tomatoes diced
- 1 red onion sliced
- 1 avocado sliced
- 1/3 cup pitted olives (or black olives), sliced (optional)
- Lemon wedges to serve

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Whisk all the marinade/dressing ingredients in a large jug. Pour out half of the marinade into a large, shallow dish. Refrigerate the remaining marinade to use as the dressing
- 2. Add the chicken to the marinade in the bowl: marinade chicken for 15-30 minutes (or up to two hours in the refrigerator if time allows). While waiting for the chicken, prepare all the salad ingredients and mix in a large salad bowl.
- 3. Once the chicken is ready, heat 1 tablespoon of oil in a grill pan or a grill plate over medium-high heat. Grill chicken on both sides until browned and thoroughly cooked.
- 4. Allow chicken to rest for 5 minutes; slice and arrange over salad—drizzle salad with the remaining UNTOUCHED dressing. Serve with lemon wedges.
