Proposed Waiting Restrictions – St Leonards Road, St Andrews

Wards Affected: Ward 18 – St Andrews

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to allow the St Andrew Area Committee to consider proposals to introduce "No Waiting at Any Time" restrictions on St Leonards Road, St Andrews.

Recommendation(s)

It is recommended, in the interests of accessibility and road safety, that Committee:

- agrees to the promotion of a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) to introduce the restrictions detailed in drawing no. TRO/20/34 with all ancillary procedures; and
- 2. authorises officers to confirm the Traffic Regulation Order within a reasonable period unless there are objections.

Resource Implications

The cost to formally promote this TRO and deliver the associated traffic management works will be approximately £2,000, which covers Roads & Transportation Services' and Legal Services' staff costs, advertising and delivery of the new infrastructure. This will be met from approved Service budgets.

Legal & Risk Implications

There are no known legal or risk implications.

Impact Assessment

The general duties section of the impact assessment and the summary form have been completed. No negative impacts have been identified.

Consultation

The local Ward Councillors, Parking Management team and Police Scotland have been advised.

Formal consultation required by the Roads Traffic Regulation Act 1984 for the TRO process will be carried out through the posting of legal notices in a local newspaper and on the affected length of roads. In addition, details of the proposed TRO will be made available on Fife Council's website.

1.0 Background

- 1.1 St Leonards Road is a busy no through road that gives access to the University Sports Centre, the newly built halls of residence and residential property mostly along the road northside of the road.
- 1.2 Parking on this road occurs on both sides of the road regularly by buses as well as players from various football and rugby clubs together with spectators.
- 1.3 St Leonards Road also registers high pedestrian and cyclist movements mostly from University students.
- 1.4 The road also has a 20-zone implemented which runs the whole length of the road.

2.0 Issues and Options

- 2.1 Representations have been received about a lack of visibility at the junction of St Leonards Road with Hepburn Road due to vehicles parked very close to the junction on St Leonards Road. This creates a hazard for vehicles and cyclists turning into St Leonards Road from Hepburn Road as they are forced to swerve on to oncoming traffic due to parked vehicles.
- 2.2 In order to improve visibility and to avoid vehicles/cyclists swerving out on to the oncoming lane, it is proposed to introduce a "No Waiting at Any Time" restriction for a length of 10 metres on Hepburn Road (both sides) and for a length of 20 metres on St Leonards Road as detailed on drawing number TRO/20/34.
- 2.3 It was also highlighted that vehicles were regularly parking on the pavement due to the width of the road forcing pedestrians, wheelchair users and prams to move onto the road. Parked cars also caused congestion on the road making it difficult for vehicles to navigate through St Leonards Road.
- 2.4 In order to ease congestion and to give a safe passageway for pedestrians/prams/wheelchair users it is proposed to introduce a "No Waiting at Any Time" restriction at a length of 133m on the northside of St Leonards Road as detailed on drawing number TRO/20/34.

3.0 Conclusions

3.1 It is considered that in the interest of road safety that a TRO is promoted to introduce a "No Waiting at Any Time" restriction as detailed on drawing number TRO/20/34.

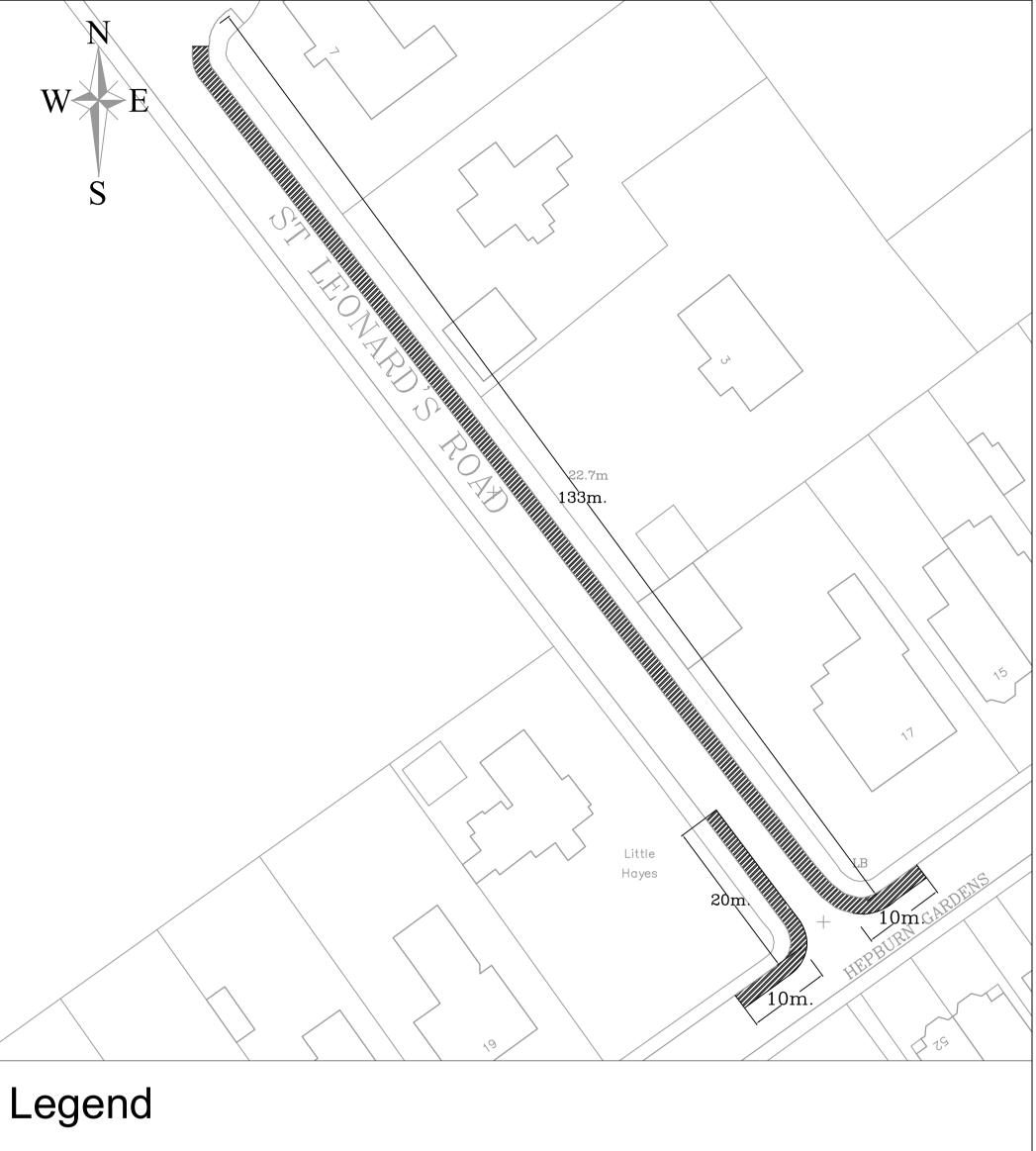

Proposed Footway Adoption - Pittenweem

Report by: Ken Gourlay, Head of Assets, Transportation and Environment

Wards Affected: 19

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to seek Committee approval to promote the adoption of a section of footway at Abbey Wall Road, Pittenweem.

Fife

Recommendation(s)

It is recommended that Committee give a decision on whether to overrule an objection to the adoption.

Resource Implications

None.

Legal & Risk Implications

None.

Impact Assessment

An EqIA is not required as the report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies and practices.

Consultation

The adoption has been promoted under the Roads (Scotland) Act 1984 with notification to frontagers and a legal notice in the local newspaper with a 28-day objection period.

1.0 Background

- 1.1 A section of footway at Abbey Wall Road in Pittenweem is not adopted.
- 1.2 The solicitor acting for the owners of the adjacent property, 67 Abbey Wall Road, has requested that the Council adopt the footway.
- 1.3 Roads & Transportation support the proposal as it would improve pedestrian safety and ensure the footway is maintained to a safe standard in future years.
- 1.4 A report to committee on 29th January seeking approval to promote the adoption through the Roads (Scotland) Act was approved (2020.NEFAC.143 para 241 refers)
- 1.4 On 12th February, the proposal was advertised in the local newspaper and notification sent to the frontagers giving a 28-day period for anyone to register an objection.
- 1.5 An objection was received by e-mail on 28th February. After some delay during the COVID-19 restrictions during which face to face site meetings were not recommended, the objector agreed to put their detailed objections in writing so they can be put to the Committee for consideration. This is shown in Appendix B.

2.0 Comments on the Objection

- 2.1 The main point of the objection is to be allowed to keep parking on part of the footway, which the objector has done for many years by their own admission, and for that part of the footway to be excluded from the adoption.
- 2.2 Where double yellow lines are in place, the parking restrictions extend to the edge of the road boundary. Under the Roads (Scotland) Act, the road boundary includes adjacent footways irrespective of whether they are adopted or not. Parking on footways adjacent to roads where there is a no parking regulation in place is in contravention of the Traffic Regulation Order and therefore the Council would be entitled to issue a Penalty Charge Notice.
- 2.3 It is noted that there is no footway crossing (with lowered kerbs) in place along the section of Abbey Wall Road where the objector parks. Crossing the footway to park without a proper approved crossing in place could be considered to be in contravention of Section 63 of the Roads (Scotland) Act and notice could be served requiring a crossing to be created. However, given the location where the parking is taking place, particularly the poor visibility, it is unlikely that a crossing would be permitted.

3.0 Conclusions

- 3.1 The proposed adoption would remove an anomaly and improve the safety of pedestrians by bringing the section of footway into the council's inspection regime.
- 3.2 Roads & Transportation consider that the objection should be overruled as the reason given, to allow parking on the footway, is illegal.

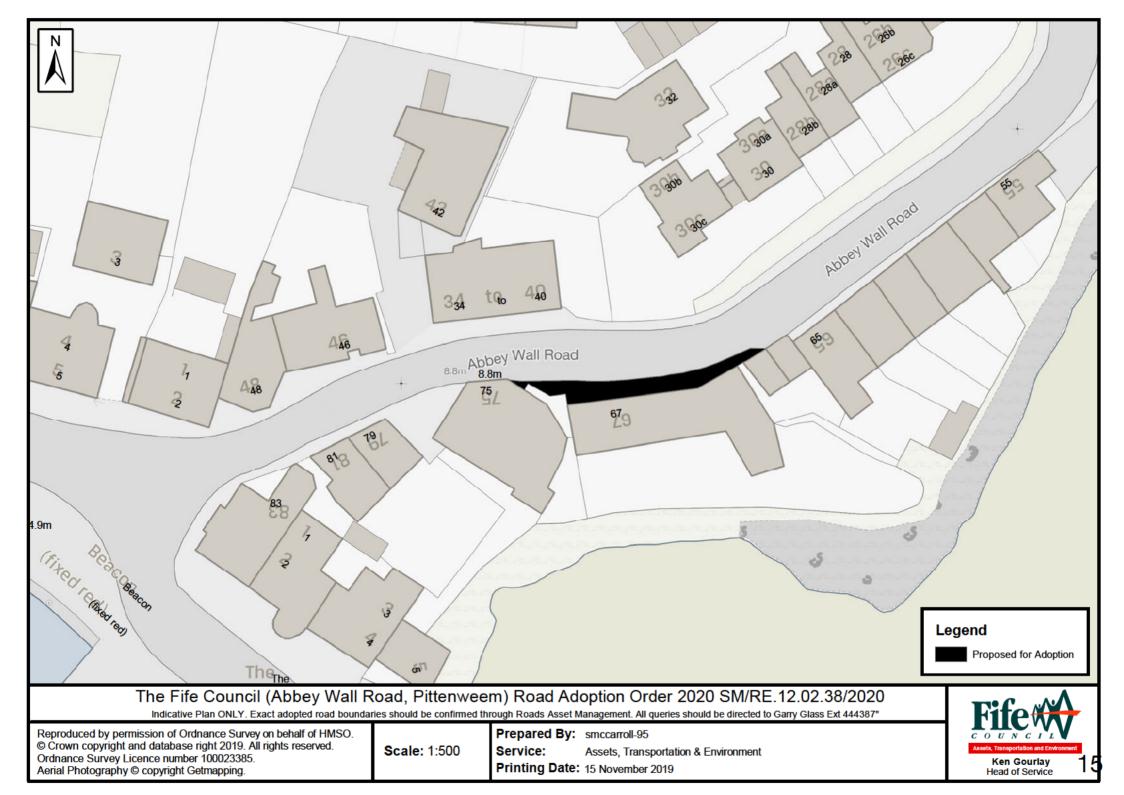

ROADS (SCOTLAND) ACT 1984 LIST OF PUBLIC ROADS / X8.4.2/LL

I apologise for the long delay in replying to your mail which you sent to Charlotte Daly on 3rd August. The reason is that I have also been dealing with a case of clinical negligence which caused my husband's death two years ago, and, although admitted by NHS Fife, is still ongoing.

To clarify the position regarding my parking problem I am not objecting to all of the original proposal but I would very much like to have an amendment to the proposal. A brief background as follows. In 1979 my husband and I bought The Old Meeting House and I now live here alone as my husband died in 2018.

Since acquiring title to the property in May Nineteen Hundred and Seventy-nine, I have parked my car on the area shown hatched in pink on the plan annexed and executed as relative hereto ("the Parking Area"). It is this Parking Area which I would like to be excluded from the adoption proposal. From the period of Nineteen Hundred and Seventy-nine to Nineteen Hundred and Eighty-four I parked my Saab 96 vehicle Registration Number DAN 20H on the Parking Area. From the period of Nineteen Hundred and Eighty-four to Nineteen Hundred and Ninety I parked my Volkswagen Polo vehicle Registration Number GSN 500W. From the period of Nineteen Hundred and Ninety-one to Nineteen Hundred and Ninety-three I parked my Saab 96 vehicle Registration Number RRY 820F. From the period of Nineteen Hundred and Ninetyfour to Two Thousand and One I parked my Volkswagen Polo vehicle Registration Number M375 TKR. From the period of Two Thousand and Two to Two Thousand and Thirteen I parked my Volkswagen Polo vehicle Registration Number ST02 RUA. From the period of Two Thousand and Thirteen to Two Thousand and Seventeen I parked my Honda Jazz vehicle Registration Number SL10 XBH on the Parking Area and from the period of Two Thousand and Seventeen to date I have parked my Volkswagen Golf vehicle Registration Number SM14 SSV on the Parking Area.

On or around September Two Thousand and Six my late husband and I sold off a portion of ground pertaining to The Old Meeting House, Seventy-five Abbey Wall Road, Pittenweem, KY10 2NE. The area in question formed old fishing sheds and these were sold to Arthur Middleton Dolby and Sheila Dolby for the purposes of development. The redevelopment of the fishing sheds commenced on or around Two Thousand and Seven and continued for a period of three years. During this period, I was unable to park my motor vehicle on the Parking Area during the day but the tradesmen cleared the Parking Area for me to park overnight.

For the sake of completeness I have used this area to park my cars on the Parking Area openly, peaceably and without interruption since May 1979. I have always asked permission from the owners of 67 Abbey Wall Road to park there, which has been granted. However, as Charlotte

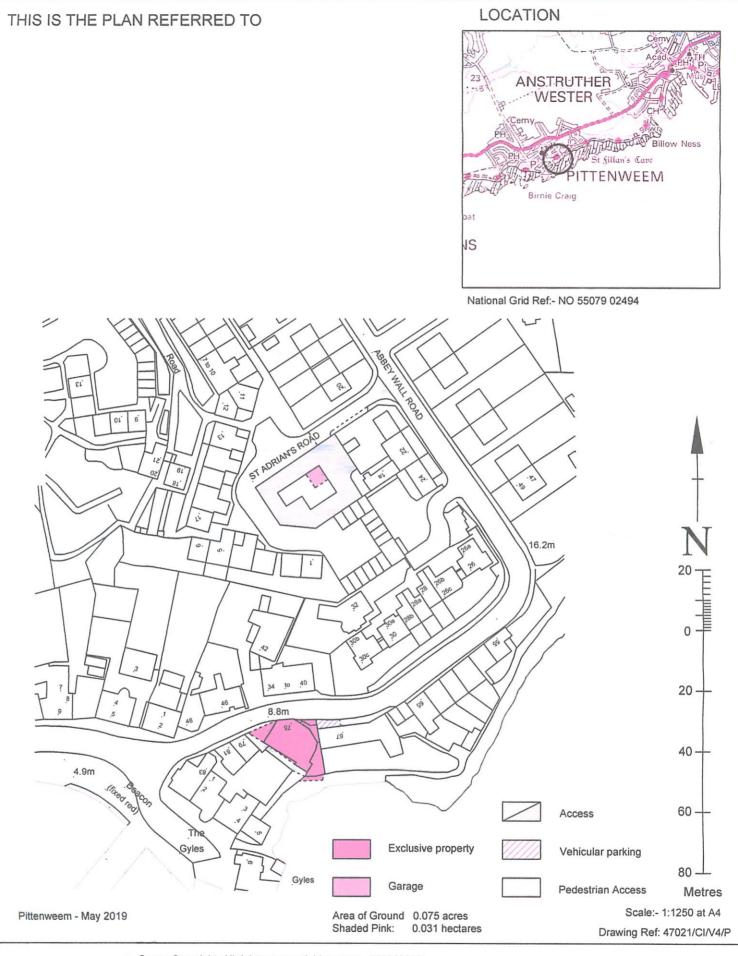
Daly found out that they did not own the land, they had no authority to grant permission. The Ramsdens sold No 67 in early August and are expected to leave soon.

I am enclosing some photographs of the footway and the parking arrangements. There are some large and heavy planters placed by the neighbours in No 67 on the footway and which they moved regularly to provide an absolute minimum space for me to park my car! I should also mention that Abbey Wall Road is in itself quite unsuitable for prams and wheelchairs because of the narrow pavements and, in places, absence of pavements.

I would be very grateful if you would be kind enough to consider my request to continue to allow me to park on the Parking Area as it will greatly assist me in my day to day living.

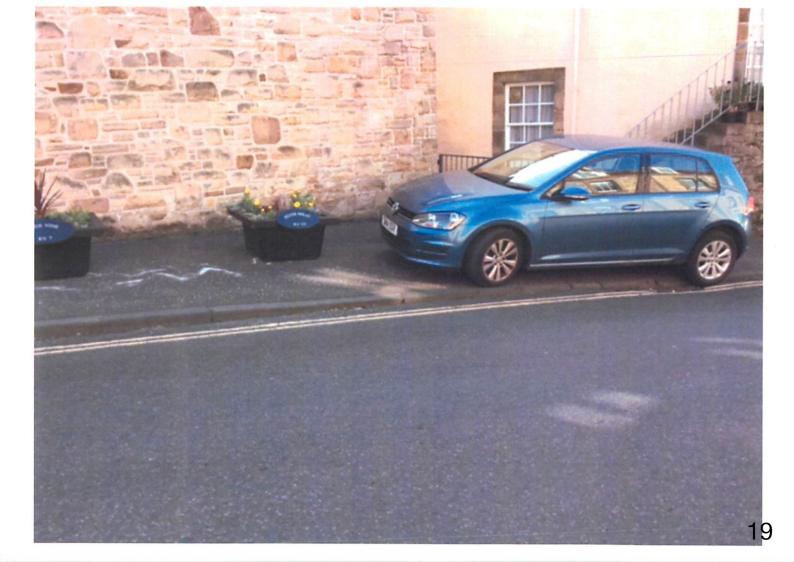

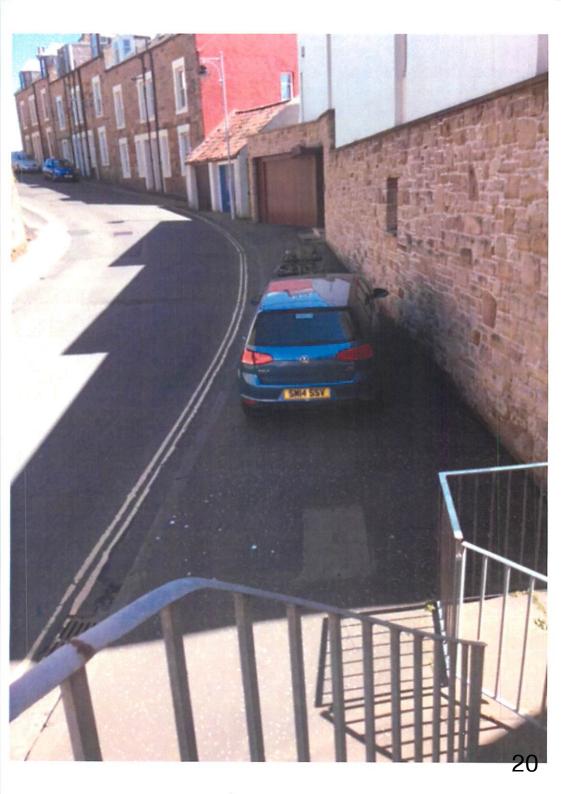
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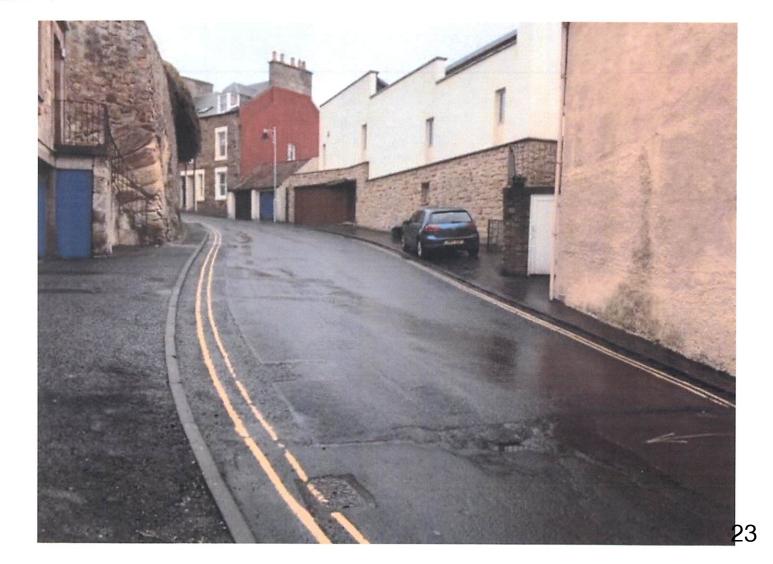

The Committee is asked to appoint a Councillor from Ward 18 in place of Councillor Jane Ann Liston as the Council's representative on the St Andrews BID Management Board.

Resource Implications

Application for Funding from St. Monans Common Good Fund

Report by: Paul Vaughan, Head of Communities and Neighbourhoods

Wards Affected: 19 – East Neuk and Landward

Purpose

To present for consideration an application received from the Jim Matthew Camera Collection Trust for grant funding from St. Monans Common Good Fund.

Recommendation(s)

Members are asked to consider an application from the Jim Matthew Camera Collection Trust for £12,500 to secure a unique collection of cameras and the St. Monans building in which it is housed.

Resource Implications

St. Monans Common Good Fund has in year funding of £26,878 unallocated in addition to revenue balances of £172,069 giving a total of £198,947 available to spend.

Legal & Risk Implications

There are no legal or risk implications based on this report.

Impact Assessment

An Equality Impact Assessment is not required because the report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies and practices.

Consultation

A meeting was held between the trustees and members of St. Monans and Abercrombie Community Council on 25 November. This was a positive meeting attended by 8 of the 10 community councillors; all 3 Ward Members were also in attendance. A motion to support the Common Good application was unanimously approved. All 3 Ward Members have independently indicated their support.

1.0 Background

- 1.1 Applications to Common Good Funds should be able to demonstrate a benefit to the inhabitants of the former Burgh concerned.
- 1.2 Applications for £5,000 and under can be determined under delegated powers if there is agreement between the local Elected Members. However the amount applied for on this occasion will require that it is determined by the North East Fife Area Committee.
- 1.3 The grant application should normally be a maximum of 50% of the total project cost except in circumstances where funding is for the maintenance of Common Good property.

2.0 Jim Matthew Camera Collection Museum

- 2.1 Jim Matthew was an avid collector who amassed an amazing array of 3,000 cameras and related memorabilia during his lifetime. At the heart of his collection are Kodak Brownies from 1900 onwards. The collection holds almost every model ever made. He also had other thematic collections, such as stereoscopic and 3D cameras and viewers including rare East European models.
- 2.2 He travelled the world with his work and bought cameras wherever he went. It was a private collection but was opened occasionally for public viewing, for example, during the St. Monans Community Arts Festival.
- 2.3 After his death in 2017 the collection was in danger of being broken up but now there is a plan to rescue and keep it as a community and national asset. A charitable trust has been set up, and a crowdfunding appeal was launched on 19 August 2020, World Photography Day.
- 2.4 The cost of securing the collection is £12,500 and the Matthew family has generously agreed to include the building to host the collection, (former Salvation Army Hall in St. Monans). The building is secure, wind and watertight but would require some refurbishment to turn it into a museum which would be open to the public on a regular basis. The collection has been valued by an expert, based on market prices, at £50,000.
- 2.5 The total cost of the project is £30,000 and the Trust is requesting £12,500 from Common Good to secure the collection.

3.0 Project Proposal

- 3.1 The charity will support and preserve a unique camera collection, housed in St. Monans, with a view to benefitting the local community and the wider public, in Fife and beyond, as means permit. The objective is to organise the care, preservation and display of the cameras and associated memorabilia with the aim of informing and educating the public on the technology involved and also photography and its history generally. The collection will augment and build upon the reputation of the East Neuk of Fife as a destination for modern photographers.
- 3.2 The collection will be open to the public as often as possible dependent on the pool of volunteers available to supplement the time committed by trustees. It will also be available by arrangement with community groups, schools, higher education institutions and other special interest groups to promote the history of photography and its art techniques and technologies. The beneficiaries of the charity are the public in general as well as those with a particular interest in photography. It is anticipated that this will result in wider benefits to the local economy of St. Monans and surrounding areas.

- 3.3 There will be a permanent exhibition within the premises in St. Monans in addition to lectures and workshops and, longer term, the potential to organise travelling exhibitions in cooperation with museums who may wish to display items from the collection.
- 3.4 When resources permit, the charity will look at providing work experience and internships for example for students requiring practical experience of curation as part of their degree course. In the long term the aspiration would be to employ staff to manage the museum.

4.0 Project Funding

- 4.1 The total cost of the project is estimated to be £30,000. £12,500 is required for the purchase of the collection and building within which to host it. £17,500 is required for fixtures and fittings to display the collection and refurbishment. Additional funding will be sought to fulfil the Trust's aim of undertaking educational outreach work.
- 4.2 Initial discussions have been held with the Heritage Lottery Fund which has encouraged the Trust to make an application in February 2021 when the HLF reopens. The HLF case worker has suggested that an application in the region of £10k be made towards improvements in accessibility and upgrading of the building and displays.
- 4.3 Other potential funding sources identified are:
 - Crowd Funding £3,500 has been raised to date.
 - Culture Grant £500 towards the cost of running seminars (post Covid).
 - Settlement Trust to support educational outreach and arts activities (post Covid).
 - Fife Environment Trust for building refurbishment. Initial contact has been made.
 - Cookie Mathieson Charitable Trust supports organisations in Fife and Tayside for educational and recreational purposes including pictorial arts.
 - Sponsorship the Trust is actively seeking support from corporate and individual sponsors and would hope to raise several thousand pounds from such sources. The Trust has targeted those in the field of photography in the first instance.
 - Donations there will be no admission charge, but visitors will be encouraged to make a donation. Special interest groups will be charged a small fee to help cover overheads.
 - Membership Scheme a Membership Scheme will be set up to enable supporters to engage with the charity.
- 4.4 Trustees have a broad range of experience and skills including in the field of film and photography, education and business. A sub-group of trustees will focus on fundraising activities to enable the charitable purposes of the Trust to be met.

5.0 Premises

5.1 The building the collection is housed in is in a good state of repair and is very secure. It is enclosed on 3 sides by other properties and the ground level entrance is opposite a local shop and has both a main door lock and a secure locked roller shutter. The shutter is well maintained and has recently had the lock replaced.

- 5.2 The two-storey high hall has one small high window in the wall and relatively inaccessible rooftop skylights. There are plans to install CCTV internally to monitor the building, not only for when it is open to the public, but also to provide additional security through heat and motion activated sensors, which would be linked via the internet to allow monitoring of the premises remotely.
- 5.3 Building, contents and public liability insurance is in place.

6.0 Advertising and Promotion

- 6.1 There has already been significant coverage of the collection, including in local, Scottish, UK and international press. It has been featured on BBC radio and on the BBC website. A special feature appeared in the Courier weekend magazine and there has been coverage in specialist photographic journals. Articles have been picked up and reprinted internationally.
- 6.2 Trustees continue to speak to numerous media contacts to raise awareness of this unique collection. The collection now has its own website, <u>www.cameratrust.org</u>, as well as featuring on <u>https://stmonans.photography/</u> and other local apps and websites. Videos of the collection feature on YouTube and the Trust has set up social media channels on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

7.0 Conclusion

- 7.1 The award of a grant to purchase the collection and hall will allow the Jim Matthew Camera Collection Trust to move forward with fundraising from other sources. The amount requested represents 42% of the total project cost.
- 7.2 Securing the collection will enable the Trust to concentrate on the improvements to the display and building refurbishment.
- 7.3 The Trust's aspiration is to make St. Monans the home of Scotland's premier Museum of Photography and enhance the village's reputation as a place with a remarkable heritage and interest for photographers and other visitors.

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to advise members of the current status of the Common Good Funds in the area and relevant fund activities over the financial year 2019-20.

Recommendations

Members are asked to:

- note the information contained in the relevant appendices for the various Common Good funds; and
- (2) offer comments as appropriate on the information provided.

Resource Implications

The additional work to produce these reports has been resourced from within Finance & Corporate Services Directorate.

Legal & Risk Implications

There are no known legal or risk implications.

Impact Assessment

An EqIA has not been completed and is not necessary as the report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies and practices.

Consultation

Consultation has taken place with Assets, Transportation and Environment Services and Fife Cultural Trust.

1.0 Background

- 1.1 Annual reporting is one of a suite of measures designed to ensure that Fife's Common Good Funds are managed and reported in a way that reflects best value for the organisation.
- 1.2 Historically, the Common Good Fund has comprised both capital and revenue balances. The capital balance consists of fixed assets which are heritable property and investments. The revenue balance comprises current assets held in the Council's accounts on behalf of the relevant fund.

2.0 Common Good Fund - Key Elements

2.1 <u>Revenue Account</u>

2.1.1 Income

The cash income received during the financial year is mainly from rents, interest on investments and internal interest. Income from net gain on revaluation is a result of the revaluation of the fund's investments at the year end.

2.1.2 Expenditure

In line with the Council's agreed policy, the first call on the Common Good Fund is maintenance of Common Good property. Disbursements/donations and other expenses are also funded from the Common Good Fund.

The amount spent on property costs and disbursements/donations are detailed within the notes to the accounts for the individual Common Good Funds.

The net effect of the income and expenditure on a Common Good account results in a surplus or deficit for the particular year. This amount is then transferred to balances.

3.0 Balance Sheet

3.1 Fixed Assets

3.1.1 Heritable Property

Heritable Property comprises land and buildings held on Common Good accounts. In the main this is municipal buildings and recreational land of various kinds.

The attached accounts reflect the assets held on the Common Good Balance sheet as at 31st March, 2020. A complete list of all Common Good assets relative to this Area is also attached at Appendix 1(b).

3.1.2 Investments

In addition to heritable property, each Common Good Fund also has investments. These investments form part of the funds capital balances. Investments are made using the Council's standard investment strategy to maximise income to the fund.

The heritable property and investments represent the capital balances.

3.2 Current Assets

The Advance to Loans Fund comprises monies held in the Council's bank account which receive internal interest from Fife Council.

The advance to loans fund, plus debtors and less creditors, represents the revenue balances.

The revenue account and balance sheet form the financial accounts for the Common Good Fund and this is attached as Appendix 1 to this report.

4.0 Moveable Property

4.1 Moveable property held as part of the Common Good comprises everything that is not land or buildings, e.g. Council Chains of Office, furniture, ceremonial robes and so on. The Local Services Network and Museums and Libraries can provide a list of this moveable property if required.

5.0 Conclusions

5.1 This reports and its appendices are intended to give Members greater information on the relevant Common Good Funds.

Purpose

This report gives elected members a position statement on the expenditure relating to the Non-Settlement Trusts covering North East Fife and a Fife-wide statement on funds as at April 2020. The report also provides feedback on the outcome of decisions taken by Committee on 29 January 2020 following a review of Non-Settlement Trust Funds.

Recommendation(s)

Members are asked to:

- 1) Note the expenditure statement for the financial year 2019/20 contained in Appendix 1.
- 2) Note the funds available at the year end.
- 3) Note and comment on the projects supported by the disbursement of these funds found in Appendix 2.
- Note the action taken to implement the Committee's decisions of 29.01.20. (Appendix 3)
- 5) Approve 3.2.2 and allocate funding to repair potholes on the middle road of Duffus Park, install a raised walkway at the entrance to the play park, erect signage to toilet facilities, allocate £90k for disabled play equipment and accessibility, provide set up costs for the Lucky Ewe project.
- 6) Approve 3.2.4 and transfer funding from the Provost Scott Memorial Fund to SRUC Elmwood College to be used for a student award.
- 7) Approve 3.2.7 to create a new sheltered seating area in Mugdrum Park.
- Approve 3.2.8 and provide 50% of the funding to Age Concern in Newburgh deferring a decision on the Laing Library Bequest until FCT completes its review of Culture and Heritage.

Resource Implications

Members will note the disbursement from Non-Settlement Trust funds in this area amounted to a total of £42,409.17 in 2019/20.

Legal & Risk Implications

This Non-Settlement report raises no legal or risk implications. Following an Audit Scotland overview of the levels of Trust dispersals within Fife, action has been taken to address the relatively low level of take-up from both groups and individuals in terms of applications.

Impact Assessment

An EqIA is not required because the report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies and practices.

Consultation

Action has been taken to ensure the availability of these funds is advertised as widely as possible with local groups and service providers. It should be noted that some of the trusts in this report do not produce significant levels of income, accordingly their practical use is somewhat limited. However, where they can be used in conjunction with local community planning budget, or as a stand-alone payment to an individual in need, they will be.

1.0 Background & Context

- 1.1 Settlement Trusts comprise several individual trusts and bequests specific to a defined geography which were brought together in 2014 following consultation with Community Councils and the charities regulator OSCR and/or Lord Advocate.
- 1.2 Non-Settlement Trusts cover more than one geography or were designated for a specific purpose. A list of Non-Settlement Trusts and a statement of fund balances is contained in Appendix 1.

2.0 Projects Supported in 2019/20

- 2.1 There are 23 Non-Settlement Trusts across North East Fife, only 5 of which were active in 2019/20 dispersing grants of £42,409.17. Information on projects supported is contained in Appendix 2.
- 2.2 With the exception of the 5 Trust Funds which awarded grants in 2019/20 all but 3 had available funds of less than £1,000.

3.0 NEF Non-Settlement Trust Review

- 3.1 In January 2020 Members agreed to take action to rationalise the number of Non-Settlement Trusts in North East Fife and to promote take up of those which are retained. The impact of these decisions will not be seen until 2020/21. A reminder of the action agreed and progress to date can be found in Appendix 3.
- 3.2.1 <u>Crail Public Library Trust</u> As there is no longer a public library in Crail it was proposed that this funding be used for the school library. However, Crail Community Partnership has indicated that they may wish to consider delivering a limited library service but are not in a position to do so at this time as they are heavily involved in community asset transfer negotiations. It is recommended that this Trust Fund is retained in the meantime.

3.2.2 <u>Duffus Park Disabled Garden Appeal</u> – 9 proposals were put forward by the Cupar Community Council who agreed that these would be considered by Ward Councillors who would make final recommendations to NEF Area Committee. The proposals were assessed against the criteria of enhancing Duffus Park and/or supporting people with disabilities. The following projects are recommended for approval:

Duffus Park Proposals

- Pothole repairs to red tirr on middle road £2,100
- Raised walkway to slow traffic at the entrance to the play park £6,500
- Signage to toilet facilities (included disabled toilets at the Sports Centre) £500

Disability Project Proposals

- Disabled play equipment and accessibility work in Cupar parks £90,000
- Set up costs for the 'Lucky Ewe' project which will provide work experience placements in land-based and dairy sheep production for people with additional support needs. £21,706
- 3.2.3 <u>Graves Dressing</u> This fund has been retained but an agreement with Bereavement Services is in place. An SLA has been negotiated for 2020/21 which will lead to a supervisor and squad being deployed in cemeteries in NEF to bring forward a programme of inspection and repair of gravestones.
- 3.2.4 <u>Provost Scott Memorial Fund</u> Ward Members propose that this Trust Fund is transferred to SRUC Elmwood College for the purpose of a student award.
- 3.2.5 <u>St. Andrews War Memorial</u> Following agreement with Planning and War Memorials Scotland action to add a WW1 soldier's name to the War Memorial will be concluded in the near future following which this Trust Fund will be closed.
- 3.2.6 <u>Stuart Bursary</u> Discussion with St. Andrews University has not taken place due to the pandemic.
- 3.2.7 <u>Thomas S. Greig's Bequest</u> There was no appetite from Newburgh Community Council or Ward Members to use the funding to upgrade Mugdrum Car Park. An alternative source of funding has been found for this purpose. The Community Council has proposed creating a new sheltered seating area in the park. Ward Councillors support this subject to further discussion with the Community Council on the existing Pavilion and seating.
- 3.2.8 <u>Thomson Bequest and Laing Library</u> It is recommended that this funding is split equally between Age Concern in Newburgh (fulfilling the Thomson Bequest for support to older people) and the Laing Library. It is proposed that a discussion on the Laing Library funding is deferred until Fife Cultural Trust concludes its review of Culture and Heritage.

4.0 Conclusion

4.1 Despite efforts to publicise the availability of Non-Settlement Trusts to local groups and service providers the uptake remains low. However, actions taken during 2020/21 are expected to significantly improve the position.

Settlement Trusts - Annual Update on Expenditure and Funds Held – 2019/20

Report by: Paul Vaughan, Head of Communities and Neighbourhoods

Wards Affected: All

Purpose

This report gives elected members a position statement on the expenditure relating to the Settlement Trusts in their area. The report also provides a Fife wide statement of funds held in both capital and revenue accounts as at April 2020.

Recommendation(s)

Members are asked to -

- Note the expenditure statement for the financial year 2019/20 found in Appendix 1.
- Note the funds available at the year-end relating to amounts held as interest, in Revenue accounts and as Capital.
- Note and comment on the detail of the projects supported by the disbursement of these funds found in section 2.
- Note the acceptable uses for this funding in Appendix 2 of this report.

Resource Implications

Members will note the disbursement from the Settlement Trust funds in this area amounted to a total of £18,999 from a potential £21,578. Members will find details of the beneficiaries of this funding in section 2 of this report.

Legal & Risk Implications

This report raises no legal or risk implications. Following an Audit Scotland overview of the levels of Settlement Trust dispersals within Fife in 2018/19 action has been taken to address the relatively low level of take-up from both groups and individuals in terms of applications. In North East Fife elected members agreed in November 2018 that Settlement Trusts would be proactively marketed to individuals who met the 'relief of poverty' criteria through the NEF Anti-Poverty Partnership.

An Equality Impact Assessment (EqIA) is not required, as the report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies and practices. An EqIA was submitted for the original proposal to change the process of disbursement for Settlement Trusts, and there were no negative impacts noted. This document is on file and available to members on request.

Consultation

There was no specific consultation process aligned to this report. Access to the grant application form is available on Fife Direct and is open to all who feel their request would meet the criteria.

The availability of these funds is advertised as widely as possible with local groups and service providers and referrals for individuals who meet the criteria are made by partners in the Area's Anti-Poverty Group. It should be noted that some of the trusts in this report do not produce significant levels of income, accordingly their practical use is somewhat limited. However, where they can be used in conjunction with local community planning budget, or as a stand-alone payment to an individual in need, they will be.

1.0 Background and Context

- 1.1 During 2016 all Area Committees were presented with an update report in terms of the first year of operation of the Settlement Trusts, this covered the period after the Trusts were reorganised and devolved to the seven areas for administration.
- 1.2 Members were informed that there would be advantages to Fife Council through the reorganisation of the 183 individual trusts administered by the authority, into 30 distinct Settlement Trusts. It was highlighted that the reduction to 30 Settlement Trusts would significantly reduce the reporting requirements to the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR), as the body that oversees the dispersal of charitable funds.
- 1.3 The reorganisation into Settlement Trusts has had the effect of releasing funds for charitable purposes, which would otherwise potentially be unused. The acceptable uses for Settlement Trusts are attached to this report as Appendix 2 and are those utilised by OSCR to clarify the legal definition for charitable activities.

2.0 Projects Supported in 2019/20

2.1. There are 16 Settlement Trusts across North East Fife, 8 of which were active in 2019/20 dispersing grant funds of £18,999. The 8 Settlement Trusts receiving no applications have very small levels of income, a total of £1,953 across the 8 Settlement Trusts.

- 3.1 By devolving, the administration of the Settlement Trust funds to the areas we have freed up a resource that can be used alongside other area held funding for the direct benefit of local people.
- 3.2 The introduction of Settlement Trusts administered locally has benefitted the current area approaches in relation to mitigating the negative impacts of Welfare Reform, and the on-going work around poverty and equality issues.

Area Housing Plan Update

Purpose

Members approved the North East Fife Area Housing Services Plan 2017/19 on the 25th October 2017. This interim report provides an update on progress in delivering service priorities and performance information for the financial year 2020/21 where figures are available at an Area level.

A revised Plan for 2021/23 will be presented at Committee once there has been the opportunity to consult on future priorities for the North East Fife Area.

Recommendation(s)

Members are asked to:

- Comment on the work progressed through the Area Housing Plan for the financial year 2020/21
- Note the Expenditure for the HRA Locality Managed Budget for 2020/21 outlined in Appendix 2.

Resource Implications

Work is taking place within agreed HRA local and capital budgets.

Legal & Risk Implications

There are no legal / risk implications arising from this report.

Impact Assessment

An EqIA Checklist is not required because the report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies and practices.

Consultation

Local tenants were involved in the development of the Area Housing Plan through local groups and events, as well as taking part in walkabouts with staff and members. We have also used feedback from the annual tenant survey to develop the plan. A similar approach will be taken to the development of the North East Fife Area Housing Service Plan for 2021/23.

1.0 Background

- 1.1. Members approved a report on 25th October 2017 which outlined the 2017/19 North East Fife Area Housing Plan and set out how we intended to:
 - Understand and address housing needs in the area
 - Deliver effective housing management
- 1.2 The Council has a vision to create a fairer Fife where all residents live good lives, make informed choices and have a sense of control so that they can reach their full potential and where all children are safe, happy and healthy. At the heart of the Plan for Fife is the aim to reduce inequalities and to promote fairness in everything that we do. It is recognised that having a fairer Fife will benefit everyone. Housing Services as the largest landlord in Fife can improve the lives and opportunities of its tenants through effective neighbourhood management and community led improvement initiatives. We have a key role to work in partnership with others to reduce poverty in Fife and to ensure that we are acting 'one step sooner'.
- 1.3. This report includes measures to outline how well we are performing and addressing housing need in North East Fife. Performance figures for the previous financial year are provided where this is available at an Area level. It also outlines how staff have adapted to deliver services during COVID lockdown. Housing Management Officers are now able to be more visible in local communities as we work our way through the Recovery Plan.
- 1.4 It is proposed that a revised North East Fife Area Housing Plan be produced for 2021-23. This will outline future priorities that are informed through discussions at Ward Meetings and reflect the views of our local communities.

2.0 Issues and Options

- 2.1 This report will focus on the following Plan for Fife headings-
 - Opportunities for all
 - Thriving places
 - Community led services
- 2.2 Attached to the report are two appendices -
 - Appendix 1 is a summary of North East Fife Area performance 2019/20
 - Appendix 2 information on the expenditure 2019/20 locally managed budget allocation.

2.3 **Opportunities for all**

 The period of lockdown was a difficult and challenging time for many in our communities. Housing have worked in partnership with others to help vulnerable households to obtain necessities such as food and prescriptions. We have also provided advice and support to tenants who were worried about their rent. Housing Services focused on delivering business critical services. This included gas safety inspections, emergency repairs, dealing with anti-social behaviour, welfare checks, urgent allocations to homeless and support to older people in sheltered housing. Staff in the North East Fife Team volunteered for redeployment to critical parts of our business. Throughout this time, we have had to adapt to change and new ways of working. It
has presented us with the opportunity to become more agile and review how we
operate. As we evolve through the Recovery Plan staff can now undertake estate
inspections and in certain circumstances visit tenants in their home. We will focus
going forward on improving the condition of our estates and addressing the welfare
needs of our tenants.

Appendix 1 provides a summary of key performance information for the Financial Year 2019/20. The following areas are highlighted –

- Void properties were turned around and reallocated 2019/20 within 30 days. This
 is an improvement for the area, with performance for 2018/19 32 days. This figure
 in line with Fife average for the same period which was 30 days to turnaround an
 empty property. It is important to minimise rent loss over the period and to ensure
 a more efficient management of our stock to drive savings in the Housing Revenue
 Account which is reinvested to improve tenant services and build new homes.
- The amount of allocations to each housing list category were as follows 39% to homeless, 31% transfer and 30% to the housing list. The allocations made to homeless applicants equated to 105 offers. Proportionately in percentage terms, the homeless outturn was slightly lower in comparison to the previous year (41%).
- We have been proactive in facilitating moves where tenants are under occupying larger family sized properties. We ensured family sized properties were made available last year for allocation following best use of stock moves. The Tenant Incentive Scheme (TIS) was used to assist five of these tenants with the costs associated with moving home. Practical help can be provided with the things that can sometimes be a barrier for people wishing to downsize and this included removal costs, decoration, new carpets, furnishings and white goods. We will continue to engineer moves where suitable properties can be identified to match the preferences of tenants who are under occupying and who have indicated they may be prepared to move.
- The Property Acquisition Policy has been used over the last year to buy back one family sized former council house. This has been used to provide permanent housing for one homeless family. We continue to actively look at opportunities to return larger former council properties back to stock to meet the housing needs of families in the North East Fife area.
- The table on Appendix One shows the recorded breaches of Tenancy actions for anti-social behaviour. Most complaints are of a low level and involve estate management or environmental type issues that are quickly resolved. We continue to work closely with the Safer Communities team to address the more serious issues reported involving anti-social behaviour. During lockdown anti-social behaviour cases increased across North East Fife.
- 2.4. Housing team have been at the forefront of tackling poverty in the North East Fife Area and assisting vulnerable tenants whose normal life has been disrupted due to the current pandemic.
 - Improving rent collection rates continues to be a challenge and for North East Fife the end of year figure was 100%. This figure represented an improvement from the previous year 97% and was just above the Fife wide average of 99%.

- The rent arrears in North East Fife at the end of last Financial Year were reduced from £613,268 to £486,064. We exceeded our target of reducing rent arrears in North East Fife. This reflected the efforts made by staff to increase contacts with tenants with a view to resolving their difficulties. The introduction of Universal Credit Officers also had a positive impact on performance. It will be a challenge to sustain this level of reduction going forward.
- It has been a priority for staff to work with tenants in debt within their patches and to liaise closely with Revenues Officers. A preventative approach is taken to support new tenants and promote early intervention. At the accompanied viewing staff discuss affordability with new tenants, the Welfare Fund and other options for sourcing household items. Through the Locality Managed Budget household items and other practical help can be provided to new tenants in need who are struggling to set up their home.
- The introduction of the Coronavirus (Scotland) Act prevents the eviction of tenants for rent arrears until the 31st March 2021. It was recognised that we needed to assist tenants facing financial pressures during the pandemic. The rent arrears process was suspended for several months and a shift in focus to reach out to tenants who were experiencing a disruption to their employment. Advice and assistance were offered to those who were self-employed, faced redundancy or part of the governments furlough scheme. A total of 77 rent allowances were awarded to tenants in North East Fife and this amounted to over £20k.

2.5 Community Led Services

- Tenant engagement is critical for the Housing Service to receive feedback and to deliver community led and relevant services. Tenants indicated to us that they wished to be more involved in improving their local areas and this will be reflected in the new Area Housing Plan going forward. The following progress has been made:
- There are now 7 tenants and residents' associations (TRA's) across the North East Fife area who work closely with us and make an active contribution to improving their local communities. Most TRA's have not been able hold meetings due to current restrictions and staff have only been able to offer support remotely. It is hoped as we progress through the recovery phases that TRA's will be able to play a more active part in their local communities.
- While there is clearly a strong sense of community and identity across North East Fife it does not always translate well into tenant participation and involvement in housing issues. Moving forward we will continue to engage with areas underrepresented by our tenant base.
- We have a strong relationship with Janice Laird (Communities Manager). We have supported our tenants through the Fuel Poverty Fund to assist tenants who are struggling to top up gas/electric meters where they have been refused by Scottish Welfare Fund and are in crisis. We are also been working with a transport initiative where 10 unemployed tenants have been supported with free concessionary bus fare vouchers. Providing tenants with free travel around NEF, Glenrothes, Leven and Dundee. The initiative is supporting our tenants to access wider services, which would normally be out of reach.

2.6 Thriving Places

Within the North East Fife area, the Housing Service Locality Managed budget has been used to support a wide range of projects across ward areas to address issues identified at walkabouts and by elected Members throughout the year. The key areas of spending have been on tree management, environmental clean-up works, landscape improvements, fencing, dealing with fly tipping and maintaining land on the housing account. A proportion of the budget has also been used to provide items for new tenants who are struggling to set up their home and support to those who are vulnerable to sustain their existing tenancies.

- 2.7 Several projects were completed over the last year to improve the local environment and make a difference in communities. These included:
 - St Katherine Court, Newburgh. Landscaping improvements.
 - Jamieson Court, Cupar. Laundry and Stairwell upgrades.
 - Provost Scott Court, Cupar. Laundry and Stairwell upgrades.
 - New fencing Newburgh, Cupar, St Andrews, Anstruther, Crail, St Monans, Tayport, Leuchars.
 - Mears Court, Leuchars. New paving slabs.
 - High Street, Strathmiglo. Ground works improvements.
 - Trees Cupar, Springfield, St Andrews, St Monans.
 - Back Dykes, Crail. Resurfacing works.
- 2.8 Information on how the Housing Service Locality Managed budget has been allocated for the Financial Year 2019/20 is attached in Appendix 2.

3.0 Mayview Update

- 3.1 In March 2019, members approved proposals to demolish the 4 blocks of flats at Mayview, Anstruther, and redevelop the site for new build Council housing after a strategic options appraisal and community consultation was carried out between 2017 and early 2019
- 3.2 When members were previously updated at Committee, demolition was expected to take place between October and December 2020, but due to lockdown restrictions some elements of the pre-demolition work have been delayed. This has had a knock-on effect to the demolition process, which is now expected to begin in January 2021, and complete in April 2021.
- 3.3 The tendering process is underway, and Property Services are expected to award the demolition contract in early December.
- 3.4 During the demolition work there will be a requirement to close part of Mayview Avenue and divert traffic. However, access to Blyth Court will be maintained at all times. Some footpaths may also be closed (rear of 5-25 Mayview Avenue and east side of 12-22 Mayview Court) to ensure the safety of pedestrians, but signs will be in place to indicate any diversions.
- 3.5 Property Services have identified that the residential property adjacent to block 2-22 Mayview Avenue, known as the Bungalow, is located less than 3 meters from the south-west elevation of the block, and demolition could entail risks to those occupying the property. Contact has been made with the owner and negotiations have begun to agree a period during which they will move out of the property to allow the block to be hand-picked. Scaffolding will be erected within the boundary of The Bungalow in order to allow access for the demolition contractor. The owner will be offered alternative accommodation for the duration of the works and will also be compensated for any damage to the garden grounds during this process and for any inconvenience caused.

- 3.6 Once the demolition contractor is on site, they will secure the site boundaries with heras fencing and install their own security systems based on their risk assessment. Prior to this point we have experienced very limited vandalism or dumping, and our current security measures have not been compromised, but this will continue to be monitored and the contractor will wish to ensure the safety of their equipment on site.
- 3.7 The demolition contract shall stipulate that demolition work will only take place on Mondays-Fridays and Saturday mornings within limited hours, and no Sunday working will be sanctioned.
- 3.8 Once all demolition work is complete and the site is fully cleared, arrangements will be made to formally hand over the site to the Health and Social Care Partnership in order that they can begin work on the new Care Home and extra care units, due to commence in 2022.

4.0 Conclusions

4.1 Our aim is to be a top performing social landlord in Scotland. Through the Area Housing Plan, we will identify local issues and plan to address these. This is intended to encourage member scrutiny of our work to address those concerns and demonstrate improved outcomes. The plans can be updated to reflect where member scrutiny shows a need to quicken the pace of improvement.

Appendix 2

Housing Service Locality Managed Budget 2019/20 North East Fife Area

The Locality Managed budget is used for three priorities which are:

- Estate Management
- Tenancy Sustainment
- Improvement Projects

Estates Management

The budget is used to deal with estate management related issues and is mainly reactive. Examples of this type of work would include managing open space areas on housing land, tree maintenance, fencing, removal of fly tipping and looking after garage sites.

Tenancy Sustainment

This involves supporting tenants to sustain their tenancies and ensuring balanced communities. Due to the impact of welfare reform we are having to take a more proactive role in this area. We can offer practical help to vulnerable tenants through tenancy assistance. The budget can be used in certain circumstances for clearing properties and providing help to source essential household items. The focus of this type of intervention is to work closely with other partner services to meet any gaps in provision.

Improvement Projects

The projects are identified through estates walkabouts, consulting with our tenants, and through working with Tenants and Residents Associations and Community Councils. These are usually proactive works to improve the local environment for our tenants. Examples would be lighting, parking provision, improvements to bin store areas, lock ups and communal areas and environmental improvements.

Expenditure to date

The budget for 2019/20 was £243k and there was a £13k overspend at the end of this year. The table below shows how the expenditure was proportioned.

Monitoring

Project work will be considered through discussions with elected members and issues identified at walkabouts. If the allocation of funds needs adjusted in line with the reactive nature of the budget, then this can be highlighted through further update reports.

Supporting the Local Community Plan – North East Fife CLD Plan and Anti-Poverty Update.

Purpose

To provide a 6-month update on the North East Fife Anti-Poverty Action Plan (2020/21) and a 12-month progress report on the work of the Community Development Team (October 2019 to October 2020).

Reporting this in one report gives a joined-up picture of the work being delivered by the Council and the voluntary sector, to address rural poverty and needs in North East Fife.

Recommendation(s)

Members are asked to:

- i) Note the work being undertaken by the NEF Community Development Team and its partners.
- ii) Feedback on activities undertaken to benefit individuals and local communities in North East Fife and to address rural poverty.

Resource Implications

This work is achieved through the delegated budgets for anti poverty, youth work and adult learning.

Legal & Risk Implications

There are no legal or risk implications based on this report.

Impact Assessment

An EqIA is not required because the report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies and practices. If any project results in a change of practices, those leading will carry out an EqIA as appropriate.

Consultation

A narrative enquiry was carried out April – June 2020 and as part of this participants were consulted on the provision of cash and food support provided during COVID lockdown. This has influenced the development of support for targeted groups.

1.0 Background

1.1 Outcomes

The Rural Poverty Plan for North East Fife 2019/21 <u>https://our.fife.scot/northeastfife/</u>. (Appendix 1) sets out the key themes that the team and partners are delivering to.

These are:

- Strengthening partnership working to address rural inequality issues
- Exploring new ways of addressing fuel poverty
- Finding new solutions to the cost of bus travel
- Supporting community groups to find local solutions to addressing poverty and inequality
- Addressing food insecurity
- 1.2 The Covid pandemic and lockdown has taken place during this reporting period. The Community Development team was redeployed to ensure that a food distribution system was established across NEF to get food parcels to those who were Shielding and waiting to be set up on the national scheme or residents in emergency need of food. A hub was set up in Cupar with a satellite centre in each remaining Ward. The team quickly established a network with over 20 voluntary organisations to get additional food / meals and other support to people in the area working with newly formed COVID groups as well as established voluntary sector partners and emergency committees. The fact that there was weekly joint Council and voluntary sector reporting on the numbers of food parcels and support given is testament to the strength of the partnership we have in the area and the awareness of community organisations of the need in their communities. Although regular weekly deliveries ceased in the summer there remains support for anyone needing to isolate and food plus toiletries donated by companies like Amazon are being distributed. During the recent October Café Inc delivery, nappies were offered free along with cleaning products for the families taking part.
- **1.3** Alongside this work the team has had a focus since the COVID pandemic on ensuring there was support for those experiencing mental health issues, needing access to financial and food support and when the schools returned, ensuring there is youth work support for young people struggling on their return to school.

2.0 Strengthening Partnerships

2.1 Community Learning and Development work in North East Fife is delivered through a Fife Council / Voluntary Sector partnership. The Community Development Team set up a new virtual network in April this year made up of the organisations listed below to ensure there was additional support and a chance for the organisations to build alliances with each other and exchange ideas and information during COVID. This has been a success with fortnightly meetings and a joint funding bid made to the Captain Tom NHS Fund for a staff member to support them in the development of a community fridge initiative. Funding from the Scottish Government Food Fund has been accessed for the purchase of an additional 3 commercial fridges to be set up in Tayport, Anstruther and St Andrews to offer supermarket food waste on a weekly basis. This compliments the Cupar one which has been operating for 18 months. This is the first time the community centres have worked together on a single issue and sought joint funding for a project. The centres have received their Fife Council Recurring grant as usual and have been working with the team to support the emergency food work and get their centres safely up and running providing after school and playgroups when this was again possible after Lockdown.

Centres involved are:

- Auchtermuchty Community Centre.
- Cosmos Community Centre, St Andrews.
- Cupar YMCA YWCA.
- Cupar Youth Café.
- Dolphin Community Centre, Tayport.
- East Neuk Centre, Anstruther and Cellardyke Town Halls (East Neuk Trust).
- Forgan Arts Centre.
- Ladybank Youth Club.
- Rio Community Centre, Newport-on-Tay.
- Tayside Institute, Newburgh.
- **2.2** The Recurring Grants these groups receive are on their third year of a three year funding settlement and during November the 3 year Monitoring is being undertaken with all organisations that receive more than £10 000. A key feature of the monitor is the financial stability of the organisations and the percentage support that the Council gives for their total running costs.
- **2.3** The Centres have shown themselves to be invaluable assets in communities with the buildings acting as food hubs, hosting emergency and COVID Mutual Aid groups, running new food insecurity projects including making meals for vulnerable groups and acting as pick up points during the October Café Inc offer in North East Fife.

3.0 Fuel Poverty

3.1 Fuel poverty is caused by low income, high fuel costs and energy inefficient homes.

The main way we are currently addressing the issue is by maximising people's income by ensuring we distribute discretionary payments to individuals to clear fuel debt and keep people's heating and lighting on. We have allocated £10000 for supporting top up fuel payments and by helping with wider food insecurity we are able to help people spend money they have on their fuel bills.

We also are raising awareness with partners of the need to take time to have a conversation with people they are working with about how they are managing to heat and light their homes and have information to signpost and help individuals and families.

4.0 Café Inc

4.1 Café Inc provision has run in the October school holidays 2019, for two days in the Christmas holidays and in October holidays 2020. Free school meal payments were paid direct to families entitled to free school meals in Easter 2020 and during the Summer 2020.

2017 meals (a combination of both hot and picnic lunches) have been distributed. 830 of these were in the October holidays 2020. It is a challenge reaching all those who need support of this kind in the holidays across a large rural area and so we tested two new approaches to address this. **4.2** New approaches tested in October holidays Two new approaches were tested - one was the distribution of supermarket vouchers to the value of £45 which provided the cost of 10 meals for families of 4 with recipe cards and online cookery workshops linked to the recipes. This was targeted at families of pupils attending small rural schools in receipt of free school meals. This group doesn't usually benefit from Cafe Inc food and activities as the families need to travel to the venues to take part. Their need is the same as those living in the larger settlements, so it was useful to have the chance to test a way to reach them. We also worked with social work teams to reach vulnerable families they were working with.

Despite a very tight turn around staff in the schools and the Child and Family social work teams worked with the local community development team and 71 vouchers for a range of supermarkets local to the families were distributed along with recipe cards. The participating schools also had the recipe cards and could invite families to take part in the virtual cookery sessions even though the cost of the food for the recipes was not provided for all the families.

The second new approach was to work with the local COVID Mutual Aid group in Auchtermuchty who were carrying out lunch distribution to families at the height of COVID and were keen to partner with us and deliver picnic meals and activity packs to those same families during the October holidays.

- **4.3 Successes** Feedback on the supermarket vouchers was very positive and 124 families engaged with the virtual cookery sessions which far exceeded our target number and is an approach we would want to develop. The activity packs that were offered alongside the picnic meals were well received with all being taken even at the end of the second week. The virtual sessions showing what could be done with the packs again was popular.
- **4.4 Summary** The total number of children and young people reached over the 2 weeks in October 2020 was 830. The offer was not restricted to those on free school meals but it was targeted at this group. The total number of children on free school meals in North East Fife is 650 so we reached 13% of these children when you look at the possibility of those children being provided with 10 meals over the whole holiday period. In fact most of the offer from the voluntary sector organisations that partnered with us, was one week so it would be reasonable to assume we reached around a quarter of those entitled to free school meals.
- **4.5 Going forward** We want to grow and develop the supermarket vouchers and virtual cookery sessions as the feedback was very positive and a sense of a community and fun was able to be fostered. The activity packs are key to the delivery and again creating some engagement and building relationships with the families was possible. Families will receive free school meal payments during Christmas 2020 school holidays.

5.0 Research in to the Cost of Bus Travel

5.1 A test of change was undertaken to further establish the issues and impact of the cost of bus travel in the area for those who are unemployed.

A range of local partner services and agencies were invited by the Community Development team to refer clients who would be willing to pilot the concessionary bus vouchers. Forty-five people (45) were put forward for participation by the partners. The sample of participants included:

- Parents of children and young people
- Parents of accommodated and looked after children
- Kinship carers
- People in education and training
- People living on their own
- People living with another adult and/or children
- Unemployed.

5.2 How did people use it?

A total of 440 journeys were recorded during the pilot.

The most common use of the vouchers was for social activities, with just under a third of journeys being made to **visit family and friends** and to **take children out on day trips**. A small number of journeys were also made by parents to **visit children where there were custody arrangements** made by the courts.

Accessing food was the second most common reason for the journeys, this includes food shopping and visits to foodbanks.

The third most common use of the vouchers was to **look for jobs, attend job clubs** or volunteering and placements, or access health care.

Journeys were also made to **support organisations** such as HomeStart, Women's Aid and the Citizen's Advice and Rights Fife (CARF), **attend training courses**, **visiting the gym and for jury duty**.

The opportunity to attend health care appointments also **allowed someone who** had missed a previous appointment because they were unable to afford the bus fare to attend their GP.

"I just couldn't go and I felt bad about it. I told the receptionist a lie - I said I was ill because I was too embarrassed to say I had no money".

The savings made also enabled them to use the money for other things which they could not normally do.

"I have to make regular trips from St Andrews to Ninewells hospital in Dundee for one of my children. Using the voucher means I save money on my fare which means I can give her a wee treat afterwards. I can't afford to do this normally".

5.3 Next Steps

The next step is two pronged with awareness raising on the need for a wider concessionary bus fare scheme to be highlighted in an issues paper being taken to the Fife Council Tackling Poverty and Crisis Prevention reform and recovery group and an awareness raising campaign to help raise the numbers of those accessing the existing help.

The research was also shared at the NEF Zoom hosted conference held on the 9/09/2020. A marketing and awareness campaign on ways to help people with the cost of bus travel is being rolled out from November 2020 – March 2021 to key services and organisations who work with those impacted by the high cost. Easy to understand promotional information and advice will be widely distributed.

6.0 Community Development Team

- 6.1 The Community Development Team_have focused on addressing:
 - Increasing first line mental health support
 - Narrative Enquiry speaking to those with lived experience of poverty in NEF
 - Food insecurity

6.2 Mental Health Work

Weekly telephone support has been offered and expanded with a partnership with the Fife Express group. The funds that have been awarded from the anti-poverty group have been matched by the Robertson Trust and there is a new Coordinator post for Befriending which along with the social prescribing project, gives NEF a much-needed provision.

The social prescribing project based at the Cupar GP Practices re started in June after a break from March. There have been 64 people seen to date with 16 live cases (this is a part time initiative with one project worker for 18 hrs per week) Most referrals are going to Community Based Adult Learning, Citizens Advice and Rights Fife and the Express Group befriending service. Other referrals have included:

- Fife Women's Aid
- Fife Carers
- Circle Advocacy
- Befriending Lounge at Castle Furniture
- Age Concern
- Fife Voluntary Action
- Bums Off Seats (Active Fife)

A new virtual book group started in May of this year in partnership with the Workers Educational Association and is a free weekly discussion group. Currently 10 attend this.

6.3 Access to IT and Digital Support

The team has secured 115 laptops and free Wi Fi for individuals and families in NEF from the Scottish Government Connecting Scotland programme. This is the highest number in Fife. Those receiving them have been very positive about the impact it has made to them. We targeted those who use our community job clubs and families working with us.

6.4 Summer Playscheme

For the first time children who were on the NEF At Risk register at the time of the summer holidays were offered a bespoke playscheme opportunity in St Andrews and Cupar. We worked with both the Cupar YMCA/YWCA and the Cosmos Community Centre and around 14 attended. The programme was delivered by youth workers.

6.5 Welfare Reform/ Community Job Clubs

The community job clubs went to a telephone service once Lockdown was introduced. Staff reached out through bulk text messaging to those who had accessed their services in the previous 8 weeks. This was a successful engagement tool and has been continued to be used. DWP suspended the requirement for people to carry out job search so attendances are lower than when this is required. One benefit of the telephone delivery has been that we have noted a change in the demographic accessing the service with more women and families contacting the welfare support workers. The split between men and women using the job clubs is fifty – fifty whereas last year it was a third women and two thirds men.

Overall we have recorded 324 participants compared to 405 over the same period the year before. This is due to the claimant commitment not being required for most of that period. We are seeing a steady rise now and the contacts that have been made have taken longer to support as they have been more complex. The team also carry out weekly support calls to the more vulnerable users and are now establishing virtual interviews from hubs around NEF to help people gain support. Face to face interviews are made when needed.

6.6 Youth Work

It has been a considerable challenge to stay in contact with young people during the pandemic. Staff have developed a safe way to engage and work with young people online on a platform called DISCORD and the team of youth workers have been trained in using this. A core of young people who were accessing our provision before Lockdown have started using this to speak to youth workers and other young people. Many young people returning to school have asked for contact with youth workers and the team are working in schools offering mental health youth work appointments and they are now also re starting group work.

The 16+ programme targeted at school leavers without a positive destination has continued with virtual meet ups before it was possible for the group to meet face to face. The staff delivered 390 hours of blended programme from October 2019 to September 2020.

Total number of young people the Community Development Team worked with is 572 which is 185 less than this time last year. We have been successful in gaining £24,257.00 funding from the Youth Work Education Recovery Fund. The funding will support delivery of a programme for young people incorporating successful youth work approaches from previous delivery, with an enhanced outdoor and virtual element. It builds on feedback from young people, youth workers and school staff and will be delivered over the next 6 months to 100 of the young people hardest hit by the impact of COVID. It is a partnership bid which has been worked up collaboratively with a number of agencies. Engaging with young people when they are in school is the most effective way to reach them as they live across many communities. Our data shows that we are able to build relationships with young people we are working with in the school environment and in group work settings in the community. The bid builds on this and will enable us to deliver double the amount of alternative curriculum activities and outdoor activities resulting in improved outcomes for young people leaving school.

7.0 Community Capacity Building

7.1 Building the capacity of both individuals and communities to address issues in communities and develop services is a key driver to the work of the community development team. CONSUL is an online platform which was first used in Fife for the East Neuk participatory budgeting exercise last year. It has now been successfully used for the Guardbridge community consultation wherecommunity projects are being showcased and voted on.

7.2 Community Capacity Building Activity

4 community led consultations across the area with a total of 58 people taking part

- 41 organisations are receiving long term support
- 57 organisations have benefitted from short term work with the team

8.0 Narrative Enquiry

- **8.1** This study sought to explore the particular impact of COVID19, using Narrative Enquiry to explore individual's experience focusing on the past (prior to Covid19); the present (experience of lockdown); and the future (what it will be like post lockdown and perhaps into a second lockdown). We chose also to focus on the themes of:
 - Food insecurity;
 - Financial security;
 - Home schooling;
 - Social health and well-being (family, relationships).
- 8.2 The research questions were:
 - What is the experience of disadvantaged residents of NE Fife during Covid 19?
 - What are the key issues these people face?
 - · What will the needs be of these residents, post-lockdown?

One of the important findings is that building on the considerable asset of the strong community spirit in the area will help communities to lead on actions and projects in their communities. There is a need for an increased number of people to feel that the solutions are within their control and training and support for those volunteering and working in their community organisations is needed.

Secondly that in terms of food insecurity and financial help a cash first response is reported as the most effective and comments were made repeatedly about the stigma involved in accessing some types of help. The community fridges project will help overcome this as people can access these for a variety of reasons and not simply food need.

9.0 Conclusion

9.1 The knowledge and understanding of the needs of the communities in NEF by both Fife Council and partners, has greatly aided an effective response to COVID. Over the past two years we have undertaken work to challenge the perception that NEF is an area where everyone is doing well. There is a focus by the Council and across partnerships on understanding the lived experience of poverty and ensuring this is influencing decisions we make about targeting resources. We have yet to feel the full impact of the COVID pandemic however these approaches will support the work addressing poverty and inequality in NEF and responding to the Council's Reform and Recovery agenda.

Further discussions took place face to face re intervention from other sources as it was apparent this young lady was struggling not only with home schooling, but also an inadequate housing situation and isolation. Within a week the family had their IT all up and running, one child who was in most need was allocated a place at the local home learning hub and Councillor was liaising on her behalf with housing provider to provide her with answers to her current situation.
