# Dreaming of owning your own home but worried about the cost?

For many across Scotland, the Open Market Shared Equity (OMSE) scheme could be the answer. Designed to support people on low to moderate incomes, this initiative helps make homeownership more accessible, especially for those who might otherwise struggle to afford a property on the open market.

#### What Is the OMSE Scheme?

The OMSE scheme is a Scottish Government initiative that helps eligible buyers buy a home by contributing between 10% and 40% of the property price. In return, the government retains the same percentage of equity in the home. When the property is eventually sold, that same share is repaid.

For example, if the government contributes 40% towards your home, you'll only need to fund the remaining 60%. Later, when you sell, 40% of the sale price goes back to the government. You can also choose to increase your share over time.

### Who Can Apply?

The scheme is open to buyers across Scotland, with priority access given to:

- People aged 60 and over
- Social renters (those renting from a council or housing association)
- Disabled individuals
- Members of the armed forces
- Veterans (within two years of leaving service)

Bereaved partners of service personnel (within two years of their partner's death in service)

This makes the OMSE scheme especially valuable for those in social housing looking to take the next step toward homeownership.

#### **How to Get Started**

If you think you might be eligible, the process is straightforward:

- 1. Check your eligibility on the official Scottish Government website.
- 2. Choose a property on the open market that fits within the scheme's criteria.
- 3. Apply through Link Homes, the administering agent for the scheme.

Kinloss Park TRA are a TRA we have managed to resurrect in the last few months through the original committee and leaflet drops. A public meeting was held at the end of May, and it was agreed we would give this a go! The TRA are keen to improve their community and work alongside Fife Council and Local Councillors to make positive steps in the right direction. It was decided at the last meeting that the TRA would request that an Estate Action plan was implemented in the area to meet with head of services to tackle

The Eden Woods TRA is based up at the new build scheme in Guardbridge and is a mixture of Fife Council tenancies and Privately owner properties. The TRA are looking to provide support with any issues that have been raised and looking at ways to improve the outlook of the scheme. The last meeting the TRA had, they invited the Guardbridge Community Council along and this was a really good chance to speak about sharing best practice. The Guardbridge Community Council gave the TRA a lot of useful information moving forward and have offered support to the TRA for future endeavours!

## Headwell Avenue – Lockup Site

As part of our ongoing commitment to estate improvement, a series of long-overdue upgrades have recently been completed at the Lockup site in Headwell Avenue in Dunfermline. Once marked by peeling paint, weather damage, and general wear and tear, these lockups had become tired and uninviting features in the area.

For years, these lock-ups served residents reliably but were more recently looking in need of some improvement. Faded paintwork, surface cracks, and visible signs of neglect had diminished their appearance and, in some cases, deterred use.

Recognising the need for action and after being made aware that there was still funding available for Lockup repair works to be carried out HMO Kieran McCord made contact with the estate management team and made them aware about the works needing to be carried out and that involved repairing surface damage, addressing structural deterioration, and applying a fresh, modern paint finish each lock up.

The improvements have resulted in clean, secure, and visually appealing lockups that now blend better with the surrounding environment. The striking new brown paintwork gives them a uniform, tidy appearance, and will encourage use in the neighbourhood.

Housing Services aim to ensure that our estates remain well-kept, safe, and positive places to live. The response from local residents and lockup owners has been overwhelmingly positive, with many welcoming the much-needed facelift. This is an example of how targeted improvements can boost pride and make a real difference to the look and feel of the neighbourhood.



# Has your home had an electrical safety check yet?

Did you know that you have a duty as a tenant to let us (your landlord) into your property to carry out regular electrical safety checks?

Electrical safety checks - where your electrical circuits, lights, switches and sockets are checked along with your smoke and heat alarms – are vitally important to keep you and your neighbours safe.

It's important you allow us access to carry out these necessary checks.

You may have already had a recent safety check and, if so, you can relax knowing that your home is quite safe. For those properties we still haven't managed to get access to, we'll be contacting you soon to arrange a time for our engineers to carry out a check.

Look out for a letter coming through your door and make sure you respond.

We'll try to arrange a time that suits you but you need to get in touch. If the suggested date isn't suitable we'll arrange another time within the next seven days. Details of who to call to arrange this will be on the letter or postcard.

Remember, if we can't get access to the property at the arranged time we might need to break in and no-one wants that because it costs you and us money. That's money that could be spent on better things.

So, please, don't ignore our letters and postcards, we are trying to keep everyone safe.

### **CCTV** Hub

There is a new CCTV Hub operating at Halbeath Depot and this will cover all the high-rise flats across Fife. This will enhance the service that we already provide to our tenants and residents. We are now able to deliver a 24/7 service to you through using this technology and staff will be working shifts to provide cover into the evening, at weekends and through the night. Staff will monitor the CCTV in your block from the centralised Hub and carry out regular foot patrols out of hours so issues can be dealt with on the spot. We are now able to respond more quickly and will continue to work closely with other services to address issues in the blocks. The CCTV footage will help us investigate reports of vandalism, anti-social behaviour and fly tipping.

The new CCTV hub will be in place from 23rd June.



During the day you will continue to see the regular caretaking staff out and about and carrying out their duties in the same blocks.

We know this is something that tenants have been asking for and hope the new service helps make you feel more safe and secure in your home.



concerns, and they'll point you in the right direction. They really are a friendly bunch!




# Smeaton Gardens TRA Community Litter Pick

Fife Council is encouraging tenants in the Levenmouth area to take part in the groundbreaking H100 Fife project – a first-of-its-kind trial using green hydrogen to heat homes instead of natural gas. This is an exciting opportunity to be part of the transition to clean, zero-carbon energy – and there's still time to sign up.

#### What is H100 Fife?

H100 Fife is replacing natural gas with green hydrogen, produced using renewable electricity and water. It's part of Scotland's commitment to tackling climate change – and Fife Council tenants can lead the way.

#### What does it mean for tenants?

If you choose to take part:

- You'll receive a free hydrogen boiler and other hydrogen-ready appliances installed in your home.
- All work is carried out by approved engineers at no cost to you
- You will receive £1,000 for participating
- You'll continue to receive support, free maintenance and safety checks throughout the trial.
- There is no impact on your rent or tenancy.



### Why get involved?

This is a chance to heat your home using, green energy – and help shape the future of heating in Scotland and the UK. Tenants who've already joined the project are reporting positive experiences, and you can still join them.

# Your Voice Matters: Why Tenant Participation Makes a Difference

Down your street caught up with Greig Henderson, Service Manager for Area Housing Operations and Regeneration, who told us why tenant participation is such an important part of the housing service:

"Tenant participation is all about giving tenants a real say in decisions that affect their homes and communities. It's not just a one-way conversation — it's about working together. We share information with tenants, and in turn, we want to hear their views and ideas."

Greig explained that when tenants get involved, they can help shape housing policies, improve conditions, and influence the quality of the services they receive.

"At a local level, it's really important that our Housing Management Officers build good relationships with tenants and local representatives," he said. "That means going along to local meetings, speaking to residents, and organising things like estate walkabouts."

These walkabouts give tenants and housing officers a chance to walk around the area together, spotting any issues and agreeing on what needs to be done. The officer takes notes and creates an action plan, so everyone knows what's happening and when.

Greig highlighted that: "Working together like this means we can better understand what tenants need and what matters most to them. It helps us provide services that are more responsive and effective.

"Getting involved can also help people feel more connected to where they live. When tenants take part, it creates a stronger sense of pride and community — and that leads to better places to live."

Greig also wanted to say a big thank-you to all the tenants who take the time to get involved and work with the housing service. "Your input really does make a difference — and we'd love to see even more tenants getting involved. Every voice matters."

## **Fuel Poverty Team**

By June 2025 the Radio Teleswitch Service (RTS) will start to be phased out as it reaches the end of its operational life and new technologies are available to replace the system.

There will no longer be a mass switch off taking place on 30th June. Instead from this date the RTS system will be phased our by area for a small number of homes at a time. You will be informed directly when the switch-off is taking place in your area.

Radio Teleswitches are a type of electricity meter which receives a radio signal to tell a meter when to switch between on-peak and off-peak rates. In Fife, you are most likely to have a Radio Teleswitch meter if you have or have had electric storage heaters in the past and are or have been supplied by Scottish Power. You may be on a tariff known as Comfortplus or have a meter with 2 or 3 different rates.

The Radio Teleswitch will tell your storage heaters when to begin charging and your immersion

heater when to turn on during off-peak periods. You will need a smart meter to replace the RTS functionality went he service ends.

Energy suppliers will replace all meters with smart meters replicating a similar function as part of the phase out. Your supplier should contact you when your area is affected. You can reach out to them directly anytime to request an upgrade.

## How do I know if I have an RTS Meter?

To identify if you have an RTS meter there are a few things you can do:

- There may be a separate teleswitch box near your meter with a "radio teleswitch" or "telemeter" label on it
- Your home has or has in the past had electric storage heating
- You have cheaper energy at different times of the day
- Speak to your energy supplier to confirm if you have an RTS meter

A teleswitch will either be a large, usually black, box near your meter. You may also have a large grey meter with blue and orange buttons. There is likely to be a label saying 'teleswitch meter'



### How do I upgrade?

You will need to upgrade to a smart meter to keep the same functionality. Your supplier should have already been in touch, but if not you can contact them to request an upgrade. Your supplier will be able to discuss tariff options with you.

Sometimes your new smart meter may not work identically, but should provide similar functionality. Your supplier can explain the differences to you.

#### I can't get a smart meter, or don't want one

Some areas or buildings with a poor phone signal may not be suitable for smart meters. You may be able to access a special type of smart meter that operates offline and has pre-set times for switching between on-peak and off-peak rates.

If you do not want a smart meter for other reasons, you should speak to your supplier to see if this is an option. If they cannot provide this option you may end

up paying more for your energy. You could also consider other options such as upgrading your heating system.

### What happens if I don't upgrade?

Your heating and hot water provision is likely to be affected if you don't upgrade your meter as part of the phase out.

Some storage heaters are switched on and off by the RTS meter so you may find that your heating is left continually on or off or that charging happens at the wrong time of day. Your electricity costs may be much higher due to the meter not recording on the correct rate. The supplier won't be able to adjust your bills without a meter upgrade.

## North East Fife Community Hub

In 2019/2020 North East Fife Community Hub bought St. David's Centre from Fife Council for the sum of £100,000 under the Community Asset Transfer provision. The hub was previously located at St. Andrews Episcopal Church Hall in Queens Terrace. The Hub was opened by famous Fifer and author Val McDermid.

The building itself was valued at £775,000 but a spokesperson from Fife Council stated that the value to the community far outweighed the loss of income and that the level of discount was justified. It has certainly proved its worth since!!

The main objectives of the Hub are to provide a wide variety of community activities which would help to relieve loneliness and provide mental and physical stimulation to anyone who would benefit from a little extra help, care and company no matter their age or ability.

At the time of moving the Hub was also home to Fife Credit Union, Fife Gingerbread group and Citizens Advice. There is also a lovely cafe and "Storehouse" [the local foodbank].

"Clothesline" the St. Andrews clothes bank works closely with Transition University of St. Andrews, St. Andrews Environmental Network, Fife Voluntary Action and Fife Council and can be found at the Hub too. The Hub is also host to the Kingdom Vineyard Church and there are conference rooms which can be hired out.

Other activities at the Hub include the cafe. There is a "warm space", community fridge, board games, cards and jigsaws are available. There is a repair and recycle session and other weekly events include a Credit Union, Coffee with a Cop, Fife Law Centre, "Let's chat", Headway, North East Fife School Holiday Crafts and Fife Advocacy Service.

## **Clatchart Court Newburgh**

The retaining wall was constructed on or around 1840's to retain one of the access routes for the railway station that was constructed and opened in 1848. The original railway station is no longer in existence and two houses have been built on the site.

The existing large/high section of the retaining wall made of a mix of stone and red brick and in a poor state of disrepair. The tarred road sitting behind the retaining wall closed to any vehicle traffic with barriers being installed at restrict access.

The Projects & Major Work team created a project for remedial works due to a health & safety point of view, this project was complex due to the situation of the wall.

The existing tarmac around the area needed a new surface as the surface was rough and uneven and wasn't looking in the best condition. This was completed as part of the project.

Autumn is a great time in the garden. Time to sit back, take stock and decide what you are going to do next year. I like to spend an afternoon - while the weather is still warm- designing and planning where I am going to put things.


Buy your bulbs in September/ October for spring flowering. Plant in clumps for the best effect and lots of colour. Try and co-ordinate flowering times so that there is always something in bloom.

My favourites are the small tete-atete daffodils, bluebells, snowdrops, hyacinths and crocus. Also easily available are bags of assorted bulbs available on line, and from the larger supermarkets and garden centres.

### Other jobs to do are:

- Plant up some cheerful coloured pots to see you over winter. Heathers, cyclamen and winter pansies are all good. Plant evergreen shrubs and
- conifer hedges while the soil is still warm.
- Raise pots up on to feet to prevent waterlogging over winter.
- Reduce the height of shrub roses to prevent wind damage over the winter months.
- Empty summer pots and hanging baskets and compost the contents.
- Give your grass areas an autumn feed and add extra seed if necessary.

- If you can get your hands on any old wooden pallets paint them up in your favourite colour. I prefer neutral colours which won't detract from the lovely colours of the little planters and troughs you can place in them in spring and summer.
- If you don't have a garden shed a pallet is useful for storing long handled garden tools. Just turn it back to front.
