Update from Head of Housing Service

Keep Building and Keep Improving Council Houses

Over recent weeks, the Council's Cabinet Committee has taken key decisions to build 1200 more council houses between 2024 and 2029 and to keep adding more energy efficiency measures to help tenants heat their homes. The Council has also agreed a revised approach to assisting tenants with dampness, condensation and mould problems in their homes.

The demand for council housing in Fife has never been greater with a record number of applicants on the Fife Housing Register and people accepted as homeless. This is a key challenge for the council at a time when we are still recovering from the Covid pandemic. Building more council houses is a key priority as well as trying to improve our performance on bringing empty housing back into use.

Continuing to improve tenants' houses is also important to make it easier for you to live more comfortably by increasing the energy efficiency level and ensuring that houses are free from dampness, condensation and mould.

Our Winter programme of assisting tenants in fuel poverty and tenants having real difficulty in adequately heating their home has now come to an end. We have assisted over 4,500 tenants to top up power meters or given practical help and support through working across the Housing Service and in partnership with Cosy Kingdom. A summer programme of help is now available on a discretionary basis to help those tenants in most extreme difficulty with fuel costs.



With the warmer weather, housing officers can now get into their estates and look at improving our neighbourhoods. We will be working closely with our partner Tenants & Residents Associations to do this, and you will find plenty of examples of successful efforts across Fife.

Enjoy the summer.

How to be more energy efficient

Home energy price increases are a worry for many of us. The best way to pay less right now is to use less. There are plenty of practical actions you can take to help save energy around your home, reduce your energy bill and your carbon emissions too.

The following will all help:

- Reducing your thermostat by 1°C Using your thermostatic radiator valves to shut off heat if the room is being used, or to turn the heat down if the room is not used all the time.
- Keeping curtains and doors closed between rooms.
- Switching appliances and devices off at the plug rather than leaving them on standby
- Using a slow cooker or pressure cooker rather than an oven
- Using LED lighting and switching lights off when that room isn't being used

Please reach out to your housing officer if you are struggling to heat your home and need advice and support.

The UK Government's Energy Bill Support Scheme - Reminder

This scheme has now ended and all vouchers for £66/67 must be redeemed by 30th June 2023. Vouchers are valid for 90 days from date of issue. Although this scheme is ending there is a new more targeted Cost of Living scheme for low income households (see below).

Energy Price Guarantee - Reminder

The UK Government's Energy Price Guarantee (EPG) will cap the typical household on a dual tariff at £3,000 per year from June 2023

That's a 20% increase on the current EPG cap, after a 27% increase in October 2022. However, since the government will also be removing the £400 Energy Bills Support Scheme grant in April, if your usage stays the same, the average energy cost will increase by 43%.

The Government announced the next round of costof-living support. Up to £900 will be paid to eligible customers receiving means-tested benefits, including tax credits, in three new instalments throughout 2023 and 2024.

Eligibility criteria are separate for each Cost of Living Payment. Receiving a previous Cost of Living Payment doesn't guarantee a customer will be eligible for the next payment. Information about the Cost of Living Payments can be found at https://www.gov.uk/guidance/cost-of-living-payment.'

Whilst we enjoy the summer months, please be mindful that although you may not be using Gas in your property, if you are on a pre-payment meter, you will still be charged a standing charge per day. Failing to top up your meter regularly to cover this will result in a build up in debt owed.

Daily standing charges for gas range from 28p – 32p and 50p-60p for electric.



Methilhaven/Sea Road Fencing project has giving our tenants their own gardens!

The purpose of the fencing project on Methilhaven and Sea Road Sheltered Housing Properties was not only to make the area appear more welcoming, but to also give tenants their own designated secure garden space.


There was a communal space to the back of the Sea Road properties that was rarely used as tenant's weren't sure what section of the space they were entitled to use and responsible for maintaining. It was agreed during the consultation period that we would divide the space with 3ft fences so the tenants would still be able to communicate their neighbours, but also have their own space to enjoy with their families. Since the fences have been installed the tenant's have taken great pride in improving and maintaining their own space.

Mr Cunningham (125 Sea Road) when I asked about the fencing "Absolutely smashing son, I love having my family visiting now".

The fencing on Methilhaven Road was dated and in a state of disrepair with many of the dividing fences

being removed due to the condition. Again, we consulted with the tenants, and they were very keen on the idea of replacing the existing fencing. The

area now appears much more welcoming, and the tenants are delighted with having a secure fencing and functioning gates.




Road Widening making everyone's lives that little bit easier!

It was brought to the attention of the Levenmouth Housing Area Team that some tenants and residents were having issues with the parking and width of the road at The Barony, East Weymss.

The area was then identified as a potential project by Cllr Ken Caldwell, Cllr Caldwell attended all site visits and kept everyone up to the date with the progress throughout. The Housing team came together with transportation and building services to discuss the best plan of action for the community. The Housing Management Officer, Mark Moir, took control of the project and started planning.

"This project was brought to our attention as we had complaints coming due to the condition of the Road. People parking on the S bend made it very tight for the busses and other larger vehicles to get around the corner. The vehicles would mount the kerb which would mean continual repairs throughout the years. As a solution we took the grass back and installed 8 car parking spaces. This has fixed all the issues with parking/kerbs etc and made the residents much happier."



Bee relocation, Lomond Crescent, Falkland

In summer 2022, Emma Bell, the Housing Management Officer (HMO) for Falkland was approached by the tenant of a property who explained that there were large numbers of bees around the outside of their property. Emma visited along with one of our Pest Control Officers to see exactly what the issue was, and it quickly became apparent that the bees were living in the wall cavity of the house, having been able to get in through a tiny hole. Neighbours estimated that the bees had been resident for around ten years!

Emma contacted an independent company who specialise in bee keeping, and who have previous experience of safely removing bees from often surprising locations. It was quickly established that these were honeybees and they likely had a

large established nest within the wall. Due to the possible size of the nest we had concerns that it may cause damage to the structure of the property if left untouched.

Housing staff worked closely with the specialists, along with colleagues from Building Services to survey the property and come up with a plan to remove and relocate the colony, and in spring this year scaffolding was erected at the property. All the staff who would be involved on the day were given training from experienced beekeepers, as well as being provided with beekeeping suits to ensure they didn't get stung.

Everyone worked together on the day to ensure that the bees could be moved to their new home, with a large hole carefully being cut in the brickwork to gradually expose the bees. Our colleagues from the





Safer Communities Team were on hand to make sure people were kept a safe distance away. The bees and their combs - some of which were full of honey and others containing the brood - were carefully removed over 4 hours and placed into temporary containers before being taken to their new home at a countryside location in North East Fife. The nest is estimated to have contained 50-60 thousand bees.

Bees are vitally important as they help to pollinate our

crops, fruit, vegetables, trees and flowers and we're really pleased that the bees are settling in well to their new purpose-built home.

If you think you may have a bee's nest on your property, please don't use any chemicals or pesticides! Contact your Housing Management Officer or our Pest Control Team in the first instance for advice.



Auchmuty Action Plan is a go!

The Glenrothes Housing Area Team had a walkabout on a rainy day in March to discuss an Estate Action Plan for the Auchmuty area. The miserable weather didn't manage to dampen anyones spirits though!

There were many different services and teams who attended on the day, and everyone combined ideas to come up with the plan for Auchmuty. This was attended by representatives from the Glenrothes Area Housing team, Grounds Maintenance, Cleansing team, Transportation, Factoring Team, Estates team, Safer Communities and Auchmuty TRA (ADTRA). By listening to the communities' concerns, the group investigated areas where complaints and issues had been raised previously and decided to target these streets to give the area a more positive outlook.

The group identified areas in Malcolm Road, Canmore Road, Dovecot, Church Street, Auchmuty Drive and the area around Woodside shopping precinct to include in an action plan to make improvements to areas. The next

step will be to meet with all parties again to agree on a programme of works and update the action plan with the timeframes and agree what specific services will be taking on the issues that were recognised.

Fire skills

This course is aimed at young people that have come into contact with the youth justice system or are on the periphery of offending behaviour. Referrals can come from Youth Offender Management Group, Schools, Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS), SACRO or other partner agencies. The purpose is to enhance core skills, such as citizenship, awareness of health and safety, confidence and communication, problem solving, self-discipline, team working and an understanding of the role the Fire Service and other agencies play in the community.

Katie and Graeme are responsible for referrals and undertake the home visits with support from SFRS.



On the days of diversion, we collect participants and transport from their home to the fire station and support the participants to participate to allow them to get the most out of the opportunity and learn about themselves as well as the impact of antisocial behaviour. The course itself is kept as practical as possible with the Fire Service facilitating all the practical elements of the course while on the drill yard as well as support the participants to engage and get the most out of the course.





F24

In partnership with BRAG enterprises and Youth 1st, Safer Communities provided the opportunity for young people that attend Auchmuty High School to participate in building a F24 kit car and competing in a race meeting at East Fortune Airfield as part of the Nationwide F24 competitions.

The young people were supported to develop the kit car from design to fabrication and then testing, as well as this, they also had to produce a portfolio of their work. Youth 1st supported the young people's learning with facilitating Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths activities, which has enabled the young people to also achieve a Youth Achievement Award. This initiative was aimed at pupils that weren't engaging in education however they relished this opportunity for an alternative learning program and they displayed fantastic initiative, practical skills, problem solving and team working. This enabled them to overcome design problems, technical issues with the motor and participate in the competition in East Fortune. The competition was fierce, with teams having competed in previous events however the team done well, coming in a respectable 8th in race 1 and 10th in race 2.....and winning an award for the best portfolio

Supporting tenants into fair, sustainable jobs

Fife Council Housing Service is working with Fife's employability support service to help tenants into fair, sustainable jobs. The right job for you can provide a firm financial foundation to a more secure tenancy and a better quality of life. There are incalculable social, emotional, physical, and mental health benefits for individuals [and their families] who progress into work.

Our employability programmes include those for -

- young people 16 to 24 years of age
- all those aged over 24 years
- people with disabilities or health conditions aged 25 and over
- people with complex mental health conditions
- lone parent families through a whole family approach to employability

We are now asking our Housing Management Officers - Cowdenbeath and North east Fife initially to have a conversation with working age tenants about job challenges and aspirations. After an initial test period we will roll out across Fife. Where tenants express an interest,

a simple referral can be made on your behalf to our employability service who will be able to suggest and arrange for appropriate support. Until then, especially if you are in a different part of Fife, you can make a direct referral yourself – contact sw.ses@fife.gov.uk and ask for a referral form. It will take only a few minutes.

That support would begin with you being given a one-to-one keyworker who will help you plan an employability journey that suits your circumstances, abilities, and work goals. They can provide advice and support to help you overcome barriers, access training and work opportunities, give guidance on the impact of paid employment on welfare benefits, contact local employers on your behalf and provide on-going in-work support.

If you feel you don't need this kind of support but are ready for a job, or a new job challenge if you already working, and would like to work for Fife Council, there are lots of opportunities available (some of these are in our housing service!). Test for change at Maryfield Crescent

The Housing's Estates Management Team were tasked to look at Fife Councils existing fencing guidance and seek to create a standard fencing policy. To assist with this, a few "Test for Change" fencing projects are being carried out

These projects are designed to test out policy principles and incorporate important factors within the planning and consultation phases to ensure meaningful engagement with the tenants and residents of the streets involved. Another of the project aims is to develop a more streamlined working process with colleagues such as the Local Area Housing teams, Building Services Fencers, Grounds Maintenance, Mutual Owners, Tenant Participation team and external contractors.

Maryfield Crescent in Leslie is the third project to be successfully completed following Herriot Crescent, Methil and Lismore Avenue, Kirkcaldy. The work at Maryfield Crescent has highlighted the excellent collaboration within Housing Services, other Council Services and the Tenants and residents of Maryfield Crescent to ensure the completed works met tenants needs. As you can see from the pictures below it has enhanced the look of the area and given the tenants a more secure and defined look to their gardens.

The remaining sites are in the initial planning and consultation phases.

Once all projects are completed an evaluation report of the findings will be submitted to the relevant Committee.

Lock Up Review Progress Report

The Housing Estates Management Team continues to progress with a review of all Lock Ups across Fife. This review looks to make best use of available budgets by demolishing the low demand, unused lock ups or those beyond economical repair and improving the condition of those remaining by using an essential maintenance approach to give tenants value for money.

Our focus, in collaboration with the Area Housing Teams and Customer Service colleagues, has continued to be on demolitions with 161 lock ups demolished in 2022/23. These demolitions were carried out across North East Fife, Levenmouth, Glenrothes, Kirkcaldy, Dunfermline and South West Fife, with Cowdenbeath prioritising a refurbishment.

Effective partnership working with Roads Design & Build within Transportation Services (RT&S), Building Services, Property Services & Grounds Maintenance Services have continued to deliver our successful demolition programme and the most recent refurbishment. Many of these demolitions, following tenant and resident consultation, have resulted in the provision of additional, much needed, car parking facilities.

Recently completed refurbishment works at Droverhall Avenue, Crossgates had been a long time coming

for tenants, having been initially delayed during the pandemic. Feedback from tenants has been positive due to the aesthetic improvement of the area, shown in the pictures below.

East Neuk Recovery Group Initiative (ENeRGI)

ENeRGI supports people in the East Neuk of Fife through a variety of projects.

Short Term Housing Support is enabling support for the purpose of promoting independent living. Short term support is delivered over a 1–6 month period.

Benefit Enquiries are completed regularly and cover a range of welfare benefits. Help includes assistance to complete application forms right through to benefit appeals.

Fuel Poverty Advice is offered in partnership with the Energy Saving Trust, Warm Homes and Greener Energy Groups. ENeRGI also provide information on renewable energy such as solar panels and air source heat pumps. They also highlight assistance available via the Scottish Government.

Food Parcels are provided to people who are unable to visit the food bank in Anstruther due to disabilities.

Drop In is exactly what it says on the tin! Referrals are not required. Drop by anytime between 10:00 and 14:00, Monday to Friday. Come in to relax, use the phone and laptop, ask for advice, speak with a support worker, or have a cuppa and a chat.

Women's Group is held on Thursdays from 11:00 to

13:00 at The Coastline Church in Pittenweem. The women who attend decide what activities they would like to do. This ranges from outings to historic areas within the East Neuk to visits to the V&A in Dundee.

Men's Group is held on Mondays from 11:00 to 13:00 and they also have their own requests which ENeRGI help facilitate. Previous outings have included crazy golf, trips, games, and work with The Men's Shed - plus much more!

Befriending is provided for people who are socially isolated. Do you have 1 - 2 hours available per week to become a volunteer befriender? We would love to hear from you! Our Befriending Co-Ordinator will be glad to tell you more.



Chicken kebab skewers

You will need: -

- Pack of boneless chicken breast or thighs cut into chunk size pieces
- 2 tablespoons of soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons of olive oil
- 1 tablespoon of dried oregano
- 2 garlic cloves (minced)
- Half a lemon (juiced)
- 3 peppers, red, yellow, and green. Chop into medium pieces
- 2 onions, chopped into chunk size pieces
- skewers (wooden or metal)

Let's make: -

- 1. Mix the chicken chunks in a large bowl adding in the soy sauce and olive oil.
- 2. add the garlic, lemon juice and dried oregano then mix well.
- 3. Cover the bowl fully and refrigerate for between 2 to 24 hours (maximum)
- 4. Preheat the grill to medium-high heat. Add the chicken, onions, and peppers onto the skewers.
- 5. Cook for approximately 14 minutes turning halfway through, until the chicken is cooked thoroughly.
- 6. Serve alone or with fresh salad enjoy!

Old School Tray Bake

You will need -:

- 250g of sugar
- 250g softened butter (room temperature)
- 250g self-raising flour
- 4 eggs
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 300g of icing sugar
- **Sprinkles**

Let's make: -

- 1. Pre-heat your oven to 180 degrees or 160 degrees for fan assisted ovens.
- 2. Mix the butter and sugar until smooth.
- 3. Mix in the eggs (one at a time)
- 4. Slowly add in the flour to create a smooth cake like batter.
- 5. Finally stir in the milk and vanilla essence.
- 6. Transfer the mixture to a grease or lined proof baking tray and cook for around 25-30 minutes until golden.
- 7. Allow the cake to cool fully
- 8. When the cake is cool combine the icing sugar with warm water a tablespoon at a time until it is thick but still runny paste.
- 9. Spread the icing over the cake and finish with sprinkles.
- 10. Allow the icing to set before cutting and serving. Enjoy!
