	"Committee notes the decision of the West Planning Committee 11 April 2018 considering the Supermarket Development in Rosyth condition (17/01554/FULL):

3. No work shall commence on the development of the retail store which will preclude, prevent or limit the use of the existing football pitch until a signed, binding contract has been submitted to the Council that demonstrates the replacement pitch will be constructed. The contract shall clearly set out the expected timescales for the new pitch to be completed. A phasing plan shall also be submitted that sets out the timing of the construction of the hereby approved retail store and delivery of the replacement football pitch (17/01553/FULL). For the avoidance of doubt, the phasing plan shall include, but not limited to, when the existing pitch will cease to be available for football matches, the anticipated opening date for the store and the anticipated date the replacement pitch will be available for football matches. Works shall only commence on the erection of the retail store (for the avoidance of doubt, this excludes works which do not inhibit the use of the existing plan and evidence that the replacement football pitch will be delivered are acceptable.

Reason: To ensure that the alternative outdoor sports facility is provided.

Additionally, Committee notes the decision of the Education & Children's Services Sub Committee of 3 November 2020 to build the replacement High School on the Fleet Grounds in Rosyth.

Moreover, Committee notes the effect that the decision to build the replacement High School in Rosyth is having on the ability to progress the following planning applications:

Proposed Waiting Prohibition: Craigleith Avenue Area (former Fraser Avenue Area), Inverkeithing

Wards Affected: Ward 6 Inverkeithing & Dalgety Bay

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to allow the Area Committee to consider proposals for the introduction of waiting prohibition regulations in Craigleith Avenue, Craigleith Wynd, Gray Place, Spencerfield Road and Spittalfield Road, Inverkeithing.

Recommendation(s)

It is recommended, in the interests of road safety, that Committee:

- agrees to the promotion of a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) to amend the restrictions as detailed in Drawings No. TRO/21/05 Before N, After N, Before S & After S (Appendices 1-4), with all ancillary procedures; and
- 2. authorises officers to confirm the Traffic Regulation Order within a reasonable period unless there are objections.

Resource Implications

The cost to formally promote this TRO and deliver the associated traffic management works will be approximately £3,000 which covers Roads & Transportation Services' and Legal Services' staff costs, advertising and delivery of the new infrastructure. This will be met from approved Service budgets.

Legal & Risk Implications

There are no known legal or risk implications.

Impact Assessment

The general duties section of the impact assessment and the summary form has been completed. No negative impacts have been identified.

Consultation

The local Ward Councillors, Parking Management team, Police Scotland and Inverkeithing Community Council have been advised.

Formal consultation required by the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 for the TRO process will be carried out through the posting of legal notices in a local newspaper and on the affected length of roads. In addition, details of the proposed TRO will be made available on Fife Direct.

1.0 Background

- 1.1 Phase 1 of the re-development of the Fraser Road area is substantially complete. Phase 2 is ongoing. Applications for approval required by condition will be submitted for further phases to complete the redevelopment of Fraser Avenue, which benefits from planning permission in principle (15/03844/PPP).
- 1.2 The Fife Council (Spittalfield Road, Inverkeithing) (Temporary Prohibition of Waiting) Order 2017 was made on 20th July, 2017 to provide the opportunity to introduce double yellow lines on the full length of Spittalfield Road during the redevelopment of Fraser Avenue. It was agreed lines would only be introduced as and when required. Only the lines which were essential got laid. This TTRO expires in July 2022.

2.0 Issues and Options

- 2.1 It is proposed to remove all regulations from the On-Street Consolidation Order 2013 that relate to Fraser Avenue and the Fraser Avenue Service Road as these roads no longer exist, as shown in drawings TRO/21/05 Before N & Before S (Appendices 1 & 3).
- 2.2 Since the opening of the new shops, there have been issues with drivers parking on the footways on Hillend Road and Craigleith Avenue, causing safety concerns for pedestrians. There is a raised junction with Gray Place and Inchkeith Wynd where the carriageway is the same level as the kerb and footway. Drivers are parking on the footway rather than utilising the parking spaces in Gray Place. It is therefore proposed to introduce a "No waiting at any time" double yellow line prohibition as detailed in drawing TRO/21/05 After N (Appendix 2) to keep the footways clear of parked vehicles.
- 2.3 It is also proposed to introduce double yellow lines on the realigned Gray Place, as marked under the 2017 TTRO (Appendix 2).
- 2.4 With Spencerfield Road being re-opened to allow vehicles to exit from Spittalfield Road into the south end of Fraser Avenue, double yellow lines were marked on the corner of Spittalfield Road and Spencerfield Road under the 2017 TTRO. These have since substantially worn away but it is proposed to mark lines permanently to keep the road clear for through traffic. (Appendix 4).
- 2.5 It is proposed to leave 20m of double yellow lines on Fraser Avenue to keep the access to the development clear until the development is complete (Appendix 4).

3.0 Conclusions

3.1 It is considered, in the interests of road safety and management, that these traffic restrictions be promoted.







Area Roads Programme 2021-22

Report by: Ken Gourlay, Head of Assets, Transport & Environment

Wards Affected: 1, 5 & 6

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to identify the projects which are proposed for approval for the Area Roads Programme in the South and West Fife Committee area for delivery in the 2021-22 financial year.

Recommendation(s)

Committee is asked to:

- i. approve the report and Appendices 1-3;
- ii. delegate authority to the Head of Assets, Transportation and Environment to manage the lists of Category 1 and 2 projects in line with the available resources/funding as the programme develops, in consultation with the Area Convener; and
- iii. note Appendices 4 and 5.

Resource Implications

The Area Roads Programme is funded from capital and revenue and some ringfenced budgets. Programmes of work will be adjusted, if required, to ensure that expenditure remains within the Service budget.

Legal & Risk Implications

There are no known legal implications. There is a risk that if capital budgets require to be reduced, we will be unable to deliver all the Area Roads Programme priorities.

Impact Assessment

An Equalities Impact Assessment is not required because the report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies and practices.

Consultation

Committee has been consulted through meetings with Members in the development of the lists of projects.

1.0 Background

- 1.1 The operation, management and maintenance of a safe and efficient transportation network has a major impact on the Fife economy and the quality of life of residents. Delivering transportation projects at local level underpins the priorities of the Fife Council Plan. Roads and Transportation has a key supporting role in relation to promoting a sustainable society, improving quality of life in local communities and growing a vibrant economy. Roads and Transportation Services also provides support to activities which are part of reforming Fife's public services.
- 1.2 The programme has been developed through the assessment and prioritisation of schemes identified by the processes below which follow the guidance identified in Table 5 of the Scheme of Decentralisation and Area Budgets approved by the Executive Committee on 17 November 2015: -
 - Feedback from meetings with elected members
 - Scheduled inspections, technical surveys, assessments and interrogation of maintenance management systems
 - Local Area Transport Plans
 - Suggestions received from elected members, Community Councils and the public
- 1.3 At its meeting on 1st February 2018, the Economy, Tourism, Strategic Planning and Transportation Committee approved a methodology for allocating devolved budgets (2018, ETSP&T, 13 para 24 refers). The methodology can be summarised as follows: -
 - The Area Committees determine local priorities for carriageway projects based on an Area Committee budget allocation commensurate with the Road Condition Index, as reported annually to the ETSP&T Committee
 - Local priorities for footway projects are decided based on an Area Committee budget allocation commensurate with the proportion of urban mileage
 - The remaining Road Safety & Traffic Management budget, combined with any available Cycling, Walking & Safer Streets grant funding aligned to safer streets, is allocated to local priorities based on and Area Committee budget commensurate with population numbers
 - The foregoing is managed and reported via the relevant Area Roads Programme.
- 1.4 The current capital plan indicates that the carriageway and footway capital budget of £7.3m in 2020-21 will reduce to £6.5m in 2021-22 and will further reduce to £6m annually thereafter.

For the South West Fife Committee area, the budgets for 2021-22 are as shown below: -

1.5 The level of capital resource allocated for carriageways and footways is concerning for future road condition. However, the Council regularly reviews the capital plan and, should this lead to additional investment for 2021-22, the allocations to Area Committees would be increased allowing some schemes from the Category 2 list to be promoted.

2.0 Issues and Options

- 2.1 Appendices 1-3 provide a detailed list of the proposed Area Roads Programme projects for budgets devolved to area committee. Category 1 schemes are committed to the programme dependent on available funding. Category 2 schemes will be promoted into the programme should any of the Category 1 schemes need to be deferred or additional funding becomes available.
- 2.2 To improve access to how the carriageways and footways programme is progressing throughout the year, an on-line system will be made available once programmes are approved.
- 2.3 Appendices 4 and 5 provide information on street lighting column replacement and structures maintenance works. These budgets are not devolved to area committees, but the works locations are provided for information.

3.0 Conclusions

3.1 The attached Appendices contain the proposed South and West Fife Area Roads Programme for 2021-22. The type of works, work location and provisional estimates are provided for each project.

Update on Dunfermline and Iron Mills Bay Integrated Catchment Study and Lade Braes, Dalgety Bay

Report by:	Ken Gourlay, Head of Assets, Transportation and Environment
Wards Affected:	Ward 1 (West Fife & Coastal Villages), Ward 5 (Rosyth) and Ward 6 (Inverkeithing & Dalgety Bay)

Purpose

To update Committee on the status of the Dunfermline and Iron Mills Bay Integrated Catchment Study (ICS) and flooding at Lade Braes, Dalgety Bay in response to motions submitted to the Area Committee on 25th November, 2020 and 13th January, 2021.

Recommendations

It is recommended that Committee:

- (i) notes that the Dunfermline and Iron Mills Bay Integrated Catchment Study (ICS) is led and managed by Scottish Water;
- (ii) notes the use of the Integrated Catchment as a supporting Study to future mitigation measures to be progressed separately and jointly by Scottish Water and Fife Council; and
- (iii) notes the progression of a design solution for the flooding at Lade Braes Dalgety Bay

Resource Implications

Financial resource for the conclusion of the Dunfermline and Iron Mill Bay ICS study is met from the current Revenue budget allocation for Flood Risk Management. Financial resource in relation to Lade Braes is expected to be met from Capital budget allocation for small drainage schemes.

Legal & Risk Implications

New duties have been imposed upon local authorities through the Flood Risk Management Act in relation to flood risk management and land use planning and it is the view of Scottish Government that these statutory duties are considered as a whole.

Impact Assessment

An EqIA has not been completed and is not necessary as this report does not propose a change or revision to existing policies and practices.

Consultation

Consultation with Scottish Water, SEPA and Scottish Government has been carried out to inform this report

1.0 Background

- 1.1 The Executive Committee agreed on 24th October, 2014 that Fife Council progress partial funding of the Dunfermline and Iron Mill Bay Integrated Catchment Study with Scottish Water leading on the management and delivery programme.
- 1.2 Within the Flood Risk Management (Scotland) Act 2009, both Scottish Water and Fife Council, as responsible authorities, have an obligation to investigate flooding from their respective assets/bodies of water. It therefore was an opportunity for both parties to progress a joint study as both bodies of waters and drainage systems interact and affect each other. It also ensured good financial sense as no double work would be required, for example, one tendering exercise and reduced staff costs in management for the duration of the contract.
- 1.3 Scottish Water led on the project as a majority stakeholder. As they had a term contract in place for the delivery of modelling works, this was seen as advantageous ensuring all sources of flooding could be modelled by one process and ensure consistency in the outcomes. The project commenced in November 2016 with an original projected completion date of 31st August, 2018.
- 1.4 While the project commenced in November 2016, the observed rate of progress was slow in relation to the programme and various concerns were raised with the consultant by both parties with regard to the outputs being provided from the early data collection exercises, survey works procured and early model runs. This resulted in delays to the contract delivery timescale estimates. This was further exacerbated by the replacement of the Scottish Water Project Manager on three separate occasions causing further delays to delivery timescales.
- 1.5 The Integrated Catchment Study takes account of the following sources of flooding:
 - Flooding from artificial drainage systems flooding as a result of the combined sewer or other artificial drainage systems (e.g. road drainage) design capacity being exceeded by rainfall runoff or from the drainage system being unable to discharge water at the outfall due to high water levels (river and sea levels) in receiving waters.
 - Flooding from small urban watercourses (including culverted watercourses) flooding which occurs from small watercourses (including culverted watercourses) that receive most of their flow from inside the urban area and perform an urban drainage function.
 - Flooding from larger watercourse and the sea flooding which occurs through the up or downstream interaction of the watercourse or the sea with the artificial drainage systems.
- 1.6 The final outputs of the Integrated Catchment Study will be:
 - An Integrated Catchment Model a powerful hydraulic model jointly owned by Scottish Water and the Fife Council.
 - Model Build, Verification and Audit Reports outline model build logic, accuracy and any reservations that will inform model users.
 - A Catchment Flood Risk Assessment Report outlines flood risk for the catchment and identifies issues that require addressing (based on defined criteria). It will, for example, set out deficiencies in the drainage network, the mechanisms and sources of modelled flooding, and an assessment of flood impact across a number of scenarios.

- Data and intelligence resulting from these that can be used by project partners to inform Strategic and Local Flood Risk Management Plans (inc. SWMPs) as well as their respective business plans and operational activities
- It will, as importantly, identify areas where solutions could be provided to mitigate existing flooding concerns and inform the design.

2.0 Current Status of Dunfermline and Iron Mills Bay Integrated Catchment Study

- 2.1 An invitation was extended to Scottish Water as Lead on this study to attend Committee to discuss with the members directly. Key stages of the ICS are:
 - Catchment Scoping
 - Stage 1 Sign off
 - Model Build and Verification
 - Stage 2 Catchment Flood Assessment Sign Off
 - (Pre-) Optioneering
 - Interventions Development
 - Stage 3 Value Management Sign Off
 - Investment Planning Scottish Water & Local Authority
- 2.2 In relation to the above, the below bullet points have yet to be progressed as they form the next phase of investigation and mitigation works. This will be progressed both separately and where necessary jointly between Scottish Water and Fife Council.
 - (Pre-) Optioneering
 - Interventions Development
 - Stage 3 Value Management Sign Off
 - Investment Planning Scottish Water & Local Authority
- 2.3 The Scoping Stage, and associated Sign Off, was completed in 2016 with the associated report issued in October 2016.
- 2.4 The Model Build and Verification stage commenced in late 2016 and continued from there until the conclusion of the Catchment Flood Assessment stage discussed below. This stage includes the collection of additional survey information both of the drainage infrastructure and rivers and undertaking flow monitoring works to quantify actual flows in systems at key locations. The modelling was verified with project partners (Scottish Water, SEPA and local authorities) as indicating a broad match to local knowledge and reality. Once agreed, the model was then used to support a wider modelling programme to fit with the Flood Risk Management (Scotland) Act 2009 works and to Scottish Water's technical criteria.
- 2.5 The Catchment Flood Assessment provides knowledge about a catchment's behaviour, where this alters natural drainage, to assist making planning decisions for the catchment. Model results are not the sole criteria on which such decisions are made. Readers of the documentation are expected to have a working knowledge of sewer and river networks and their regulatory environment. An understanding of sewer and river modelling will be beneficial and readers who do not already have that are encouraged to do so. This stage was reviewed and finalised in June 2020, and key deliverables were supplied.

- 2.6 The ICS is now awaiting follow up discussions between Scottish Water and Fife Council to identify appropriate next steps depending on project findings (Scottish Water responsibilities, Fife Council responsibilities and shared responsibilities).
- 2.7 An Optioneering stage will be commissioned should an area of work be identified that would be best considered to fit within a 'shared responsibilities' context.

3.0 Lade Braes – Dalgety Bay

- 3.1 The South West Area Committee, at their meeting on 13th January, 2021, requested an update to be provided on the flooding concerns at Lade Braes, Dalgety Bay.
- 3.2 The primary flooding factor in this location is overland surface water from private land that affects properties on Lade Braes as well as the public road.
- 3.3 Different drainage systems were installed in the park in the past, some as early as 1983. However, most of the existing drainage systems have been lost due to a lack of maintenance and the introduction of landscaping works within then private land.
- 3.4 While this land is not in Council ownership, it is currently maintained by Grounds Maintenance (formerly PSOS) and agreement was reached that a more permanent solution would be considered, subject to funding being allocated.
- 3.5 Various design proposals were progressed and discussions commenced with Scottish Water to agree a suitable discharge point for the surface water. These discussions have proven to be lengthy and are continuing. Once concluded, it is hoped that a connection to Scottish Water network will be permitted to allow the construction to progress.
- 3.6 While no funding was originally available for these proposals, the Capital provision within the Policy and Co-ordination Committee report of 18th February, 2021 has provided a financial resource to carry out this work within the 2021/2022 financial year, subject to Scottish Water acceptance of the design discharge point into their surface water asset.

4.0 Conclusions

- 4.1 In conclusion, in relation to the ICS for Dunfermline and Iron Mill Bay the current position is:
 - Catchment Scoping completed
 - Stage 1 Sign off completed
 - Model Build and Verification completed
 - Stage 2 Catchment Flood Assessment Sign Off completed
 - Copy of complete model not yet provided although access to SW model is available.
 - On receipt of model outputs from Scottish Water investigation can be programmed to progress local actions both independently and in partnership with Scottish Water.
 - Any investigation and mitigation works will be progressed on a Risk Based process with all other sites identified within Fife Council also considered within this risk based approach.

4.2 Lade Braes flooding concerns have been investigated and a design solution prepared. Currently awaiting final sign off by Scottish Water in relation to a suitable discharge point to their network. The works are proposed to be funded from the Capital fund agreed at Policy and Co-ordination Committee on 18th February, 2021.







South and West Fife Area Local Community Plan - Plan4South & West Fife Area

Wards Affected: Wards 1,5 and 6

Purpose

To update members on progress and changes made to the Local Community Plan (LCP) to align with the current Reform and Recovery Priorities which build on recovery planning work across the partnership in the context of the COVID 19 pandemic.

Recommendation(s)

Members are asked to:-

- (i) note the efforts to actively develop projects under the agreed Plan4Fife Themes; and
- (ii) continue to support the Plan4South & West Fife as it adapts and changes to focus on Recovery and Reform.

Resource Implications

Local Community Planning activities are funded through various sources, including the Local Community Planning Budget, Service and Partner budgets, and external funding. Partners also contribute to delivery of the LCP by developing targeted project and initiatives.

There is an expectation that service planning processes will address issues raised through the Local Community Planning process.

Partners and Officers go above and beyond to change their normal ways of working, to resource the required changes to make the Plan a success.

Legal & Risk Implications

There are no legal or risk implications arising from this report.

Impact Assessment

An Equality Impact Assessment and summary form has been completed.

Consultation

There has previously been extensive consultation in the production of the Plan4South & West Fife Area. The most recent being in April 2019 where several thematic working groups were established under the Plan for Fife Themes; Opportunities for all, Thriving Places, Inclusive Growth and Jobs and Community Led

Services. The working groups included members of the public, community groups representatives, third sector organisations, elected members and council officers.

The Plan4South & West Fife area will be reviewed in relation to the Reform and Recovery Priorities, these will be discussed with partners and partnership groups over the next three months.

1.0 Background

- 1.1 Fife's Partnership Board approved Fife's Local Outcome Improvement Plan the Plan4Fife in April 2018; in accordance, a requirement for local community plans to be produced in each area as: "...the key local delivery vehicles for the Plan for Fife." The four themes of the Plan 4 Fife are: Opportunities for All; Thriving Place, Inclusive Growth and Jobs and Community Led Services.
- 1.2 Towards the end of 2019, the Fife Partnership Board began to review the Plan for Fife's three-year actions. The intention was to undertake a wide-ranging review of the Plan, covering the 'areas of focus' and expected outcomes, the twelve ten-year ambitions would remain as they are. This would provide an opportunity for the Fife Partnership Board to address the findings of the 2020 State of Fife report. The review would also provide an opportunity to put actions to address the climate emergency at the heart of the plan.
- 1.3 The South and West Fife (S&WF) Local Community Plan (LCP) sets out a clear and ambitious vision for the local area. This vision was fully endorsed and owned by the South and West Area Committee in June 2019. Other delivery plans and services in the area should be clearly aligned with the local community plan in order to help deliver its vision and aspirations. The Area Committee, as the owner of local vision and LCP process, will therefore consider progress and scrutinise local partnership plans as part of their contributions to the delivery of the local vision.
- 1.4 The annual Progress Report April 2020 March 2021 presented gives information on the progress of the themes and priorities as identified by the members of the S&WF Planning Partnership.
- 1.5 However, experience from the COVID-19 pandemic suggests that there is now a need to further review this approach. This is to avoid creating separate and parallel processes around post COVID recovery and reform and the wider Plan for Fife review.
- 1.6 In South &West Fife officers have created a COVID Lay-By (appendix 1) for work that cannot presently progress due to lockdown restrictions. This is listed under the four Plan4Fife Themes. The content of this is document is fluid and will be updated as and when each initiative is able to progress. All Project Leads have been contacted requesting an update of progress to date.
- 1.7 Action Plans (appendix 2) have been created for initiatives that were in the original Plan4South&WestFife and those that have developed since April 2020. All pre-COVID ongoing initiatives in the original LCP still sit within their area of focus and theme but have now been aligned with Fife Councils' four Reform and Recovery Priorities.
- 1.8 It is therefore proposed that the initial phase of the Plan for Fife review focuses on a small number of priority areas that are key to post COVID recovery.

2.0 Recovery Priorities

2.1 The S&WF Local Community Planning Partnership will now begin to review their areas of focus and actively tie in with the four Reform and Recovery priority areas;

Tackling poverty and crisis prevention Leading economic recovery Addressing the climate emergency Sustaining services through new ways of working

- 2.2 Within each of the above areas there are opportunities to look at new approaches, building on the experience of Fife's response to the pandemic, including how we work with vulnerable people and families and how we build community capacity through local place-based working.
- 2.3 Partners will also be asked to consider how the Local Community Plan will link with the People and Place Leadership Model. The Council Executive Team approved the 'Place Leadership A People and Place Approach' on 2nd September 2020. This approach aims to streamline and allow for a more effective partnerships a local level and will allow local priorities to be incorporated into Service priorities.
- 2.4 The Welfare Reform and Anti-Poverty Action plan and Community Learning and Development plan are now reflected in the Reform and Recovery Priorities within the Local Plan4 S&WF.

3.0 Progress

- 3.1 This format of reporting will inform future reports to area committee. Due to COVID restrictions many community planning partners have been unbale to meet their commitments to delivery key projects and some updates are still pending from these organisations.
- 3.2 Appendix 2 highlights work that has been undertaken between April 2020 and March 2021. Appendix 3 details work that has been concluded under the Plan4South and West Fife.

3.2.1 Tackling Poverty and Crisis Prevention; Café Inc @Home provides referred families with an opportunity to access affordable food and a chance to prepare a range of nutritious meals, while developing skills and confidence during the October and December School Holidays. A box of food was delivered to families with recipe cards included. Families were able to access online videos for recipes ideas relating to the meal kit ingredients via 'Our South and West Fife and Villages' Facebook page. A total of 64 adults and 135 children and young people engaged in the project during this period.

3.2.2 Leading Economic Recovery; Regeneration of Inverkeithing High Street. The core group have continued to meet online, and the Town House Community Group are also meeting online. Works have been delayed due to tender issues and obtaining materials. A planning application has been submitted to Fife Council for the Town House. An application to the Scottish Government Regeneration Capital Grant Scheme (RCGF) seeking additional support towards the Town House element

of the Inverkeithing Heritage Regeneration programme was successful and the project has received £475,000 towards the Town House Community Hub project. The RCGF bid was led by our project partners, Fife Historic Buildings Trust.

3.2.3 Addressing the Climate Emergency. A multi-agency group consisting of representatives from Scottish Water, SEPA and Fife Council continue to meet to resolve flooding related matters in the Rosyth. A joint response is activated when weather warnings are received and information is shared across the agencies to deal with any localised flooding incidents. Scottish Water and Fife Council are utilising modelling information generated by an integrated catchment study to identify long term solutions for the issues experienced in the area.

Residents of Culross supported by local Councillors have recently established a flood forum as a means of resolving flooding issues experienced within the village. As part of their response the group have been awarded monies from the Local Community Planning Budget to purchase equipment to help deal with any incidents.

3.2.4 Sustaining Services Through New Ways of Working; No-one Left Behind. An online platform was developed using DISCORD to enable young people to engage with the programme three times per week, this was supported by activity packs delivered to the young people which allowed a blended learning approach to be taken. Devices including Chromebooks and iPads were provided to all young people who required them. Connectivity via MIFI devices were also available if they were unable to access the internet at home. There have been 327 attendances at these sessions between May 2020 – January 2021.

4.0 Neighbourhood Plans

- 4.1 Along with the Plan4South & West Fife Area, Neighbourhood Plans are being produced which the local area team will have a role in supporting. The local community planning partnership will develop further neighbourhood plans throughout South and West Fife in some cases in collaboration with refreshment of local plans produced with Coalfields Regeneration Trust.
- 4.2 Actions within the Inverkeithing Neighbourhood Plan are continuing to be progressed by the Development Trust. The Friary Gardens play park; initial ideas have been generated and plans are developing for a community consultation exercise. The trust has also been taking part in discussions with Fife Council with regards to the creating more biodiverse planted areas at several sites around Inverkeithing.
- 4.3 Work to progress the Oakley and Comrie Neighbour Plan continues with the establishment of the West Fife Spice Girls Group. This group actively engage local isolated women in weekly conversations and activities. 24 members of the group take part in the weekly sessions and have covered topics including dealing with social isolation and how to manage poor mental health.
- 4.4 Actions within the Blairhall Neighbourhood Plan have been progressed and a community pantry has been developed. The pantry runs weekly and had approx. 50 regular attendances. The Community Council are exploring the idea of developing this provision into a Social Enterprise.

4.5 Officers from the Community Development Team are developing a phased approached to community engagement which will support the development of the North Queensferry Local Action Plan. Timescales for this project are subject to change and will be dependent on current COVID-19 restrictions. Online consultation options are being explored with established community groups in the area.

5.0 Conclusion

- 5.1 This report is an update of the work that has been undertaken from March 2020 to April 2021.
- 5.2 Guidance from Fife Partnership and the impacts of the Covid-19 Pandemic will influence the key priorities for 2021 onwards. Experience of the response to the COVID-19 emergency in Fife, together with the emerging strategies for recovery and reform, provides a valuable opportunity to refocus work and delivery for the Plan4 S&WF.
- 5.3 Progress on the Local Community Plan will be determined and influenced by current guidelines and any restrictions. Officers are considering options including online workshops that will reflect community and partner voices. Officers are keen to bring community representatives and partners together as soon as possible to update on existing, new initiatives and to share any progress made in their priorities that have been included in the LCP. This will also bring the People and Place leadership approach to the forefront of local community planning.


