Local Government Benchmarking Framework (LGBF)

LGBF is a high-level benchmarking tool designed to support Fife Council senior management and elected members to ask questions about key council services.

LGBF helps Fife Council compare its performance against a suite of efficiency, output and outcome indicators that cover all areas of local government.

The framework provides high-level 'can openers' which are designed to focus questions on why variations in costs and performance are occurring between similar Councils. They do not supply the answers, that happens as Councils engage with each other and 'drill down' and explore why these variations are happening.

LGBF Returns are due annually, and publication of the LGBF forms part of each council's statutory requirement for public performance reporting (PPR), replacing the previous SPI Regime.

Each authority is allocated a family group of similar authorities based on factors such as deprivation and urban density so that each authority can compare its performance to that of similar authorities and seek performance improvement where appropriate.

Key findings for Fife 2023/24

Overall

- Since 2010/11, Fife has improved its performance on 63 (59%) of LGBF indicators.
- Between 2022/23 and 2023/24, Fife's performance has improved on 38 (36%), stayed the same on 18 (17%) and deteriorated on 49 (47%) of LGBF indicators.
- While there has been an improvement in performance and cost indicators over time, recent performance is more mixed. Satisfaction indicators have shown little improvement.
- Fife's overall performance has remained consistent year on year, with a recent decline compared to the previous year. In 2023/24, Fife has 44.9% of indicators in the top two quartiles, 32.7% in the 3rd Quartile and 22.4% ranked in the bottom Quartile.

Culture and Leisure Services

- 75% of Culture & Leisure Services indicators have improved and 25% have deteriorated since the base year.
- The cost of sports facilities and library visits has increased compared to last year, whereas the cost per museum visit, as well as parks and open spaces, has decreaed and is now more aligned with the Scottish Average.
- Satisfaction levels with libraries is declining although remains higher than Scotland.

Corporate Services

- 86% of Corporate Services indicators have improved and 14% have deteriorated since the base year.
- The cost of collection of Council Tax has improved and an increase in statutory penalties income has helped Fife to remain the top performing Council in Scotland.
- Sickness absence levels continue to increase and remain significantly worse than the Family Group (FG) and Scotland.

Children's Services

- 50% of children's Services indicators have improved, 6% have stayed the same and 44% have deteriorated since the base year.
- The percentage of Pupils Gaining 5+ Awards at Level 5 and 6 from the 20% most deprived areas has increased slightly from previous year. These figures continue to lag behind their Family Group and Scotland as a whole.
- The Percentage of P1, P4 and P7 pupils achieving the expected CfE levels in Numeracy and Literacy has remained unchanged from previous years, however both are below their Family Group and Scottish Average.
- While attendance rates have been consistent, pupil exclusion rates have increased significantly from previous year.
- The participation rate for 16–19-year-olds has decreased compared to the previous year and continues to be lower than the Family Group and Scottish Average.

Economic Development

- 69% of Economic Development indicators have improved since base year and 31% have deteriorated.
- The Percentage of unemployed people assisted into work from programmes supported or funded by the council has increased from last year.
- Fife's average Town Centre Vacancy Rate continues to increase and sits higher than both the Family Group and Scotland.
- Claimant Count is now below pre covid levels, however Fife remains slightly higher than Scotland.

Tackling Climate Change

• Fife has continued to improve performance since the base year with a slight dip for Transport and Electricity in the latest year 2022-23.

Environmental Services

- 79% of Environmental Services indicators have improved since base year and 21% have deteriorated.
- Net Cost of Waste Collection per premises is rising, however still remains better than the Family Group and Scotland.
- Cost of Trading Standards and Environment Health has reduced from previous year and sits below Family Group and Scotland.

Financial sustainability

- 40% of Financial Sustainability indicators have improved, 20% have stayed the same and 40% have deteriorated since the base year.
- Over the past two years, total usable reserves as a percentage of the council's annual budgeted revenue have decreased, falling below Family Group and Scotland average.
- The uncommitted General Fund balance as a percentage of annual budgeted net revenue is significantly lower than previous years, Fife is below Family Group and Scotland.

Housing Services

- 60% of Housing Services indicators have improved, 20% have stayed the same and 20% have deteriorated since the base year
- Gross Rent arrears and Average number of days taken to complete non emergency repairs remain similar to last year, and are better than Family Group and Scotland.
- Council Dwellings meeting Scottish Housing Quality Standards has improved from last year and is performing better than Family Group and Scotland overall.
- Fife has continued to maintain performance in terms of rent lost through properties being empty, matching the Family Group and better than the Scottish Average.

Adult Social Work Services

- 27% of Adult Social Work indicators have improved since base year and 73% have deteriorated.
- Over time, there has been a notable decline in the percentage of adults supported at home who agree that their services and support have positively impacted their quality of life and helped them live as independently as possible.
- % of carers who feel supported to continue their caring role has increased.
- Residential costs per week, per resident for people 65+ and the rate or readmission to hospital within 28 days has increased slightly from previous year and is worse than Family Group and Scotland.
- Delayed discharge rates has improved from previous year, and remains above Family Group and Scotand.

Expenditure Trends

Since 2010/11, in line with other areas of Scotland, Fife has seen increased expenditure
on support for care-experienced children (29.9% increase), adult social care (29.8%
increase), and education (17.6% increase). Conversely, substantial reductions have
been targeted in non-statutory services to balance statutory and ring-fenced
commitments elsewhere. Areas where Fife's expenditure has increased in the last year
mirror national trends, but indicate relatively steeper increases in expenditure.

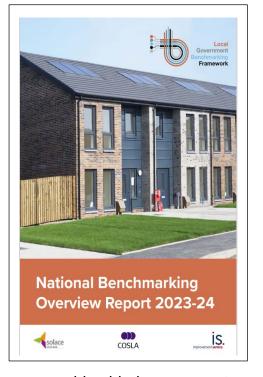
National Benchmarking Overview Report 2023-24

National Benchmarking Overview Report 2023-24

This year's report provides an evidence-based picture of the impact of deepening economic, workforce and demand pressures on local government services and the communities they serve. It reveals the extraordinary effort and achievements delivered across local government against an increasingly challenging backdrop and the difficult decisions councils are having to make about the shape and level of service delivery.

The report highlights that Councils are continuing to make savings and are facing increasingly difficult choices with their spending priorities. Expenditure within social care, education, and support for care experienced children continues to be sustained and enhanced. There are relative reductions in non-statutory services, in order to provide balance to statutory and ringfenced commitments elsewhere.



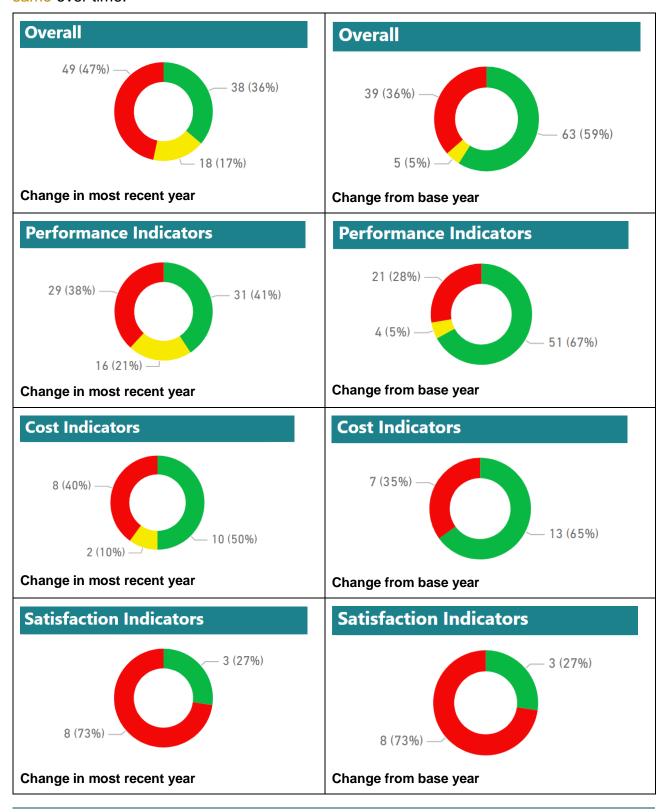
Over the last decade, council service performance has shown considerable improvement with 68% of performance indicators within the LGBF suite showing some improvement since the base year. There is however evidence that in recent years, in an increasingly challenging financial climate, year on year trends show a slowdown in this improvement, and an increase in the number of performance indicators which are now declining. In the last two years, the rate of decline has overtaken the rate of improvement (45% compared to 39% respectively). If the current trend continues, the improvements and progress that has been achieved thus far, could potentially be lost and council service performance may start to decline over the longer-term.

Fife's Position 2023-24

Since 2010/11 (base year), Fife has improved its overall performance on 63 (59%) of LGBF indicators. Between 2022/23 and 2023/24, overall, Fife's performance has improved on 38 (36%), stayed the same on 18 (17%) and deteriorated on 49 (47%) of LGBF indicators.

While there has been an improvement in performance and cost indicators over time, recent performance is more mixed. Satisfaction indicators have shown little improvement.

The graphs show the proportion of indicators that have improved, deteriorated or stayed the same over time.

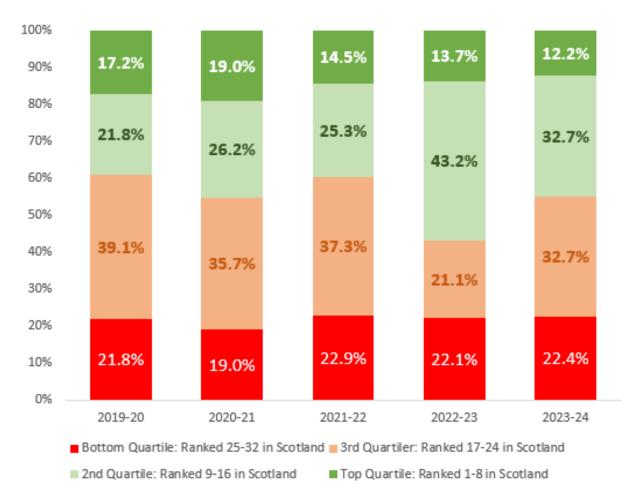


An overall comparison of LGBF performance across all 32 Councils in Scotland shows year to year fluctuation in the number of indicators where Fife features in the top two quartiles.

Fife's current position for 2023-24 shows 44.9% indicators in the top two quartiles, 32.7% in the 3rd Quartile and 22.4% ranked in the bottom Quartile.

The table below demonstrates that overall performance has remained consistent year on year, with a reduction in proportion of indicators in the top two quartiles compared to the previous year. However, caution is advised when interpreting data, due to issues such as, data availability, publication delays and some data only being collected on a biennial basis.

Fife's Position 2023-24 by Service Areas

Culture & Leisure Services

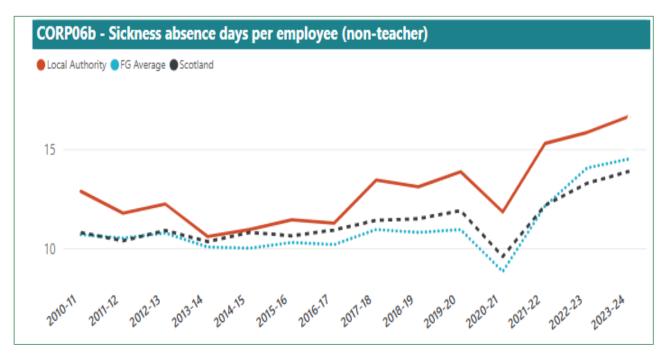
- The cost of sports facilities and library visits has increased compared to last year, whereas the cost per museum visit, as well as parks and open spaces, has decreased and is now more aligned with the Scottish Average.
- Satisfaction levels with libraries is declining although remains higher than Scotland overall.
- Satisfaction with parks and open spaces remains steady year on year. Meanwhile, satisfaction with museums and galleries and leisure facilities, though lower than previous years, continues to perform better than Scotland overall.

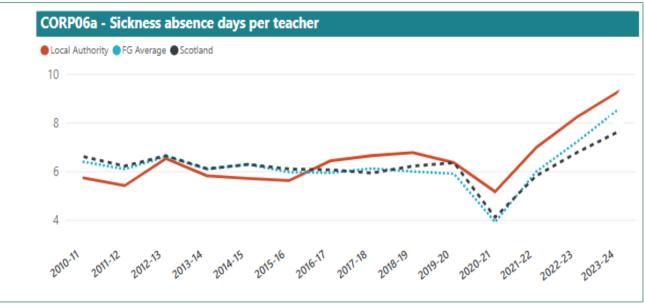


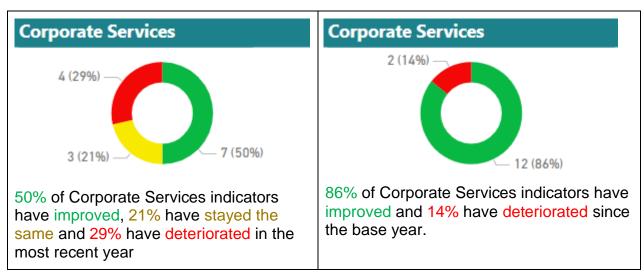


Corporate Services

- Gender Pay Gap is improving and is peforming better than the Family Group and Scotland as a whole.
- The proportion of the highest paid 5% of employees who are women remains the same as last year, however this is better than the Family Group and Scotand.
- Percentage of Invoices sampled that were paid within 30 days has improved from last year and remains better than the Family Group and Scotland overall.
- Proportion of SWF Crisis Grant decisions within 15 days has improved since last year, and is performing better than the Family Group and Scotland.
- Council Tax Income has remained consistent over the last few years. The cost of collection of Council Tax has improved compared to previous years and an increase in statutory penalties income has helped Fife to remain the top performing Council in Scotland.
- Corporate Assets: the percentage of operational buildings that are suitable for their current use and percentage of internal floor area of operational buildings in satisfactory condition remain similar to previous years.
- Sickness absence levels continue to increase and remain significantly worse than the Family Group (FG) and Scotland (see absence charts below).

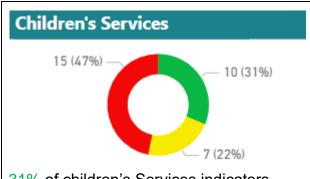




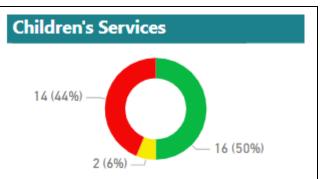


Children's Services

- The Cost of Primary and Secondary School Pupils remains lower compared to Fife's Family Group and Scotland overall.
- The percentage of Pupils Gaining 5+ Awards at Level 5 and 6 from the 20% most deprived areas has increased slightly from previous year. These figures continue to lag behind their Family Group and Scotland as a whole.
- The gross cost of children looked after in residential-based services and in community settings is lower than last year and remains similar to Family Groups and Scotland overall.
- The overall average total tarrif, as well as the tarrifs for Quintiles 1-5 continues to be lower than the Family Group and Scottish Average.
- The Percentage of P1, P4 and P7 pupils achieving the expected CfE levels in Numeacy and Literacy has remained unchanged from previous years, however both are below their Family Group and Scottish Average.
- School attendance rates have stayed consistent with the previous year. School Attendance rates for 'looked after pupils' is better than the Family Group and Scotland as a whole.
- Pupil exclusion rates have increased significantly from previous year.
- The participation rate for 16–19-year-olds has decreased compared to the previous year and continues to be lower than the Family Group and Scottish Average.
- The proportion of child protection re-registrations within 18 months has increased from the previous year and is underperforming compared to the Family Group and Scotland.



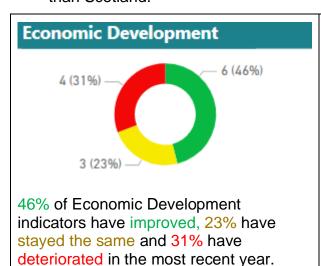

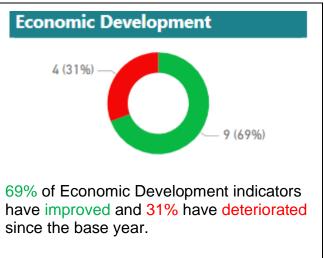

Economic Development

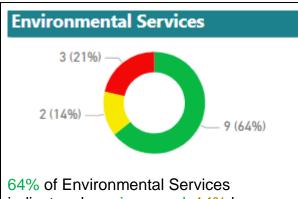
- The Percentage of unemployed people assisted into work from programmes supported or funded by the council has increased from last year.
- The costs of Planning and Building Standards per planning application has shown recent decline, although better than the Family Group.
- Investment in Economic Development and Tourism is similar to previous year, and remains lower than Family Group and Scotland.
- Properties receiving Superfast Broadband contiues to increase.
- There has been an improvement compared to base year in the proportion of people being paid the Real Living Wage.
- Fife's average Town Centre Vacancy Rate continues to increase and sits higher than both the Family Group and Scotland.
- Claimant Count is now below pre covid levels, however Fife remains slightly higher than Scotland.



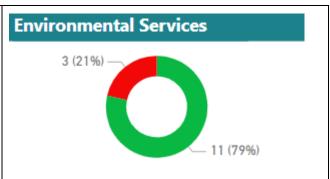


Environmental Services

- Net Cost of Waste Collection per premises is rising, however still remains better than the Family Group and Scotland.
- Net Cost of Street Cleaning is lower compared to previous year, however remains higher than Family Group and Scotland.
- Cost of Roads per kilometre improved.
- Percentage of A, B and C class roads considered for maintnance treatment all remain lower than previous year and similar to Family Groups and Scotland overall.
- Cost of Trading Standards and Environment Health has reduced from previous year and sits below Family Group and Scotland.
- Household waste recycling rates are being sustained.



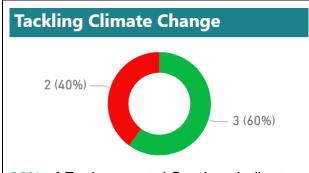
64% of Environmental Services indicators have improved, 14% have stayed the same and 21% have deteriorated in the most recent year.



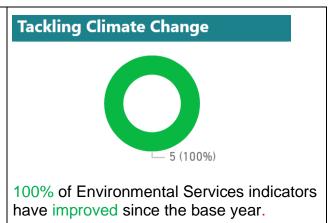
79% of Environmental Services indicators have improved, and 21% have deteriorated since base year.

- Fife has continued to improve performance since the base year with a slight dip for carbon emissions, including from Transport and Electricity, in latest year 2022-23.
- Data for 2023-24 is lagging for this indicator set.

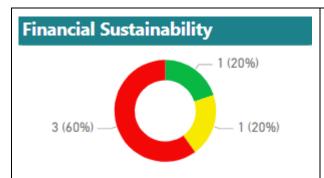


60% of Environmental Services indicators have improved, and 40% have deteriorated based on most recently available data.

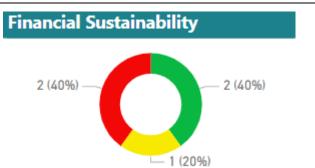


Financial Sustainability

- Over the past two years, total usable reserves as a percentage of the council's annual budgeted revenue have decreased, falling below both the Family Group average and the Scotland-wide average.
- Additionally, the uncommitted General Fund balance as a percentage of annual budgeted net revenue is significantly lower than in previous years, placing Fife below both the Family Group and the Scottish Average.



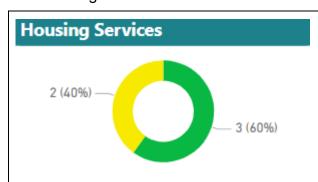
20% of Financial Sustainability indicators have improved, 20% have stayed the same and 60% have deteriorated in the most recent year.



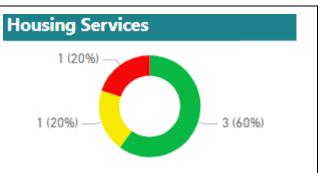

- Council Dwellings meeting Scottish Housing Quality Standards has improved from last year and is performing better than Family Group and Scotland overall.
- Fife has continued to maintain performance in terms of rent lost through properties being empty. Currently matching the Family Group and better than the Scottish Average.



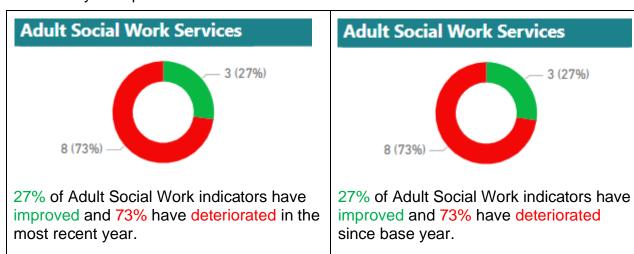

Adult Social Work Services

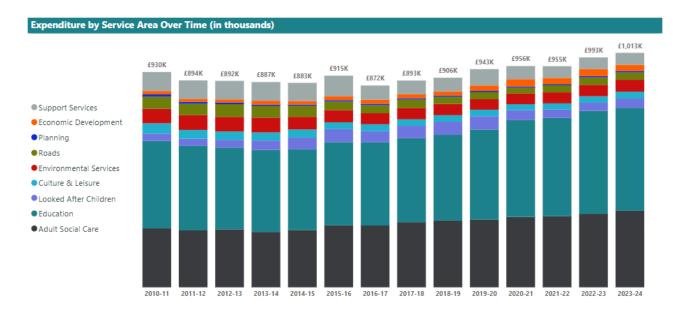
- Home Care costs per hour for 65+ remain similar to the previous year, however these are higher than the Family Group and the Scottish Average.
- The percentage of older people with longer term care needs receiving personal care at home is being sustained.
- Over time, there has been a notable decline in the percentage of adults supported at home who agree that their services and support have positively impacted their quality of life and helped them live as independently as possible.
- % of carers who feel supported to continue their caring role has increased.
- Residential costs per week, per resident for people 65+ and the rate or readmission to hospital within 28 days has increased slightly from previous year and is worse than Family Group and Scotland.
- Delayed discharge rates have improved from previous year, and remain above Family Group and Scotand.



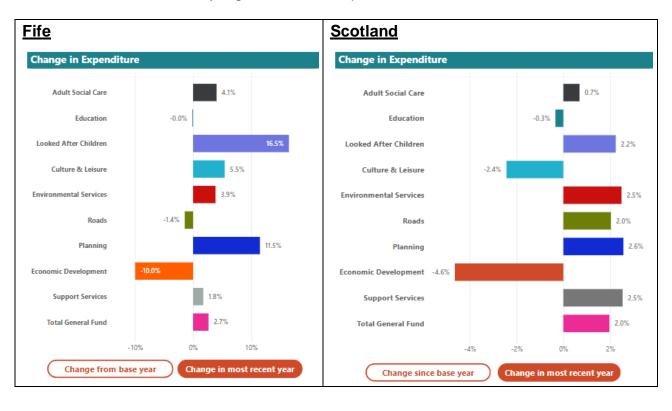

Expenditure Trends

Councils are confronted with increasingly challenging decisions regarding their spending priorities. The chart below shows trends over time Fife's expenditure by service area:

Conversely, in line with other areas of Scotland, substantial reductions have been targeted in non-statutory services to balance statutory and ring-fenced commitments elsewhere. Areas where Fife's expenditure has increased in the last year, mirror national trends, but indicate relatively higher levels of expenditure.

The Local Government Benchmarking Framework (LGBF) and the Fife findings presented in this report form a key element of Fife Council's improvement priority to develop a single system for strategic planning and performance reporting. This includes integrating corporate, service, change and thematic planning with robust data, performance analysis and insight to support service delivery and enable better scrutiny of our objectives and progress by elected members and the public.

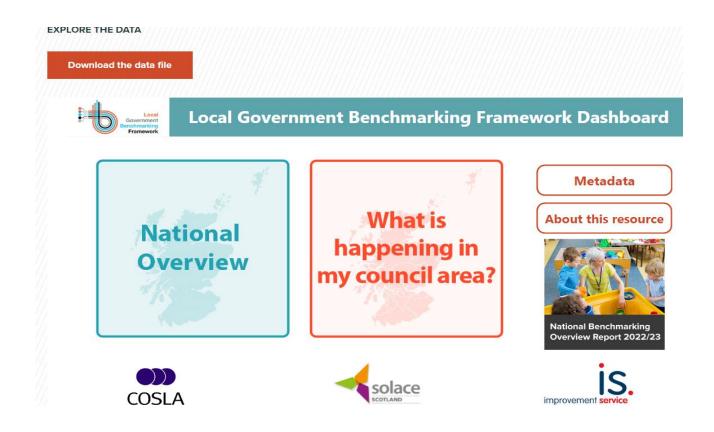

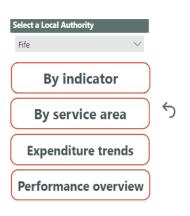


Step 2: Once the Local Authority for Fife has been selected, a range of the following options will appear:
